IN MEMORIAM: JAMES I. FIELDS BY RICHARD SILLS

CLC Member James I. Fields died on March 30, 2014, at Garden Spring Center in Willow Grove, PA, where he lived for several years. Previously, he was a resident of Ambler, PA.

Mr. Fields was 72 years old, and was the retired President and CEO of Fielco Industries, Inc., Huntingdon Valley, PA, a manufacturer of adhesive products. He was born in Philadelphia, the son of the late Dr. Allan Fields and the late Rose Fields. He is survived by his three children, Daniel J. Fields (and his wife Lauren), Jeffrey S. Fields (and his wife Neda), and Samantha Jill Koellhoffer (and her husband Gary). He is also survived by three grandchildren, Ella Michael Fields, Summer Jade Fields, and Miranda Hope Koellhoffer; his former wife Phyllis Fields; and many good friends. He was predeceased by his sister, Beth Fields Black, and his granddaughter, Allison Paige Koellhoffer.

Jim was an avid antique car enthusiast, who greatly enjoyed touring in his vintage Cadillacs, his twelve-cylinder Packards, and his Chrysler Airflow. He

was an active member of the Cadillac & LaSalle Club, the Antique Automobile Club of America, the Classic Car Club of America, and the Packard Club. Mr. Fields was also a devoted opera fan, and maintained season tickets for many years at the Metropolitan Opera in New York. He frequently entertained at his home in Ambler and in his apartment in New York, and would often arrange for opera singers to be present at his parties to entertain his guests.

Car Show Rules

- Rain or Shine: The car show will take place rain or shine. No refunds.
- <u>Safety</u>: If a vehicle has fluid drips or leaks, the owner must bring absorbent material or drip pans to avoid slippery conditions and to protect the showroom floor or show field parking lot. The Potomac Region reserves the right to prevent any cars with excessive fluid leaks from entering the show field. It is recommended that a working fire extinguisher be in every vehicle.
- Judging / Parking Rules: The Potomac Region reserves the right 1) to determine each vehicle's judging class and 2) each vehicle's placement in the show field. There will be no parking on the grassy areas whatsoever, due to sprinkler heads and possible rut damage. Vehicles will be peer judged by the individual owners of the registered cars. Registrants will be able to judge vehicles in all classes, including their own. 1st, 2nd and 3rd place awards will be given to winning vehicles in each class.
- Lunch Tickets: Each registered car owner will receive one free lunch ticket. The lunch ticket will entitle the person to receive the following from **Red**, **Hot & Blue BBQ**, who will be serving food:
 - 1) One Beef, Chicken or Pork Sandwich
 - 2) One Side order of Beans or Potato Salad and Cole Slaw
 - 3) One Drink including bottle water

Anyone without a lunch ticket will pay Red, Hot & Blue directly at the time of their purchase.

- **41st Annual AACA Chesapeake Region Parts Meet, Howard Co Fairgrounds, West Friendship, MD, Mar 8.** A brief thaw in the winter weather had the attendees slogging through mud at this popular meet.
- 2. Upcoming PR Events:
 - Spring Driving Tour to Mid Atlantic Antique & Collector Car Center, Kennett Square, PA, Sat, Apr 13. Activities Director Scot Minesinger is planning to hold a driving tour, although not a caravan, to the MACCC in April to coincide with the AACA's Brandywine Region's Annual Flea Market at the car center.

OLD BUSINESS:

- **Motor Vehicle Legislation:** Thanks to the efforts of Franklin Gage and Carol Yarnell, among others, Maryland legislation failed to meet deadline for passage of the two bills recently proposed that would have impacted collector car owners: SB629 that would have permitted local jurisdictions to impose a surcharge of \$20 per vehicle registration and HB1290 that would have affected Maryland's "Historic Vehicle" registration.
- **2014 CLC-Grand National:** National Director Jack McClow reminded members to send their Grand National registration forms as soon as they are able. Also, Jack said that if the inter-active on-line registration form is used, which many folks find is easier, the information is calculated automatically, and the legibility and accuracy are generally improved.

CLC CELEBRATES 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF HOTEL HARRINGTON STORY BY MARA CHERKASKY AND JACK MCCLOW PHOTOS BY RIPPLE EFFECT PRODUCTIONS AND RICH AND FITZSIMONS



On March 1, 2014, the Hotel Harrington in Washington, DC celebrated its 100th anniversary. The Harrington is the longest continuously-operating hotel in the District of Columbia. Our CLC Treasurer, Jack McClow (picture far right in front row), has been the hotel's controller for over 25 years. Joining him were some of his closest CLC friends (pictured above with the 100th Anniversary cake depicting the hotel) who traveled from multiple regions, including the Central Ohio, Peach State, Potomac and Raritan River, to the 100th Anniversary party.





Downtown Washington, DC bustled in 1914. Elegant new office buildings rose amidst the 19th century theaters, shops, saloons, and newspaper offices. Nine department stores drew crowds of shoppers. A few blocks away, Washingtonians and increasing legions of tourists marveled at the wonders displayed in the Smithsonian's recently opened Natural History Museum.

Harrington Mills, a hotelier, spotted an opportunity. He and business partner Charles W. McCutchen built a hotel that met "popular one-roomand-bath-demand," an unusual concept at the time, as described by the *Washington Post*. They set aside special "sample rooms" for traveling salesmen to show their wares to buyers from nearby stores. Mills and McCutchen officially opened their Hotel Harrington, at 11th and E Streets, NW, on March 1, 1914.

Designed by the architectural firm Rich & FitzSimons, the six-story hotel boasted a dining room and two-story lobby with a mezzanine, all finished in marble. Upstairs, mahogany-trimmed hallways led to 80 rooms, all with running water and most with private baths.



The hotel proved so successful that in 1918 Mills and McCutchen doubled the size of the lobby and built a 12-story annex along E Street, containing a two-story ballroom and 100 additional rooms. The Harrington now ranked among the city's largest hotels. A final expansion in 1925, a 12-story wing with another 125 rooms, filled in the rest of the E Street block to 12th Street.

In 1932 the hotel installed Art Deco embellishments, including the stainless steel canopy, with back-lit letters, over the front entrance. Always innovative, the Harrington in 1938 became DC's first air-conditioned hotel. Late 1940s modernization resulted in reduced ceiling heights in the ballroom and lobby, and modern finishes and furnishings throughout the building.

A skyscraper by DC standards, the Harrington was the ideal location for the city's first television station and transmission tower. DuMont Corporation's W3XWT (soon renamed WTTG-TV and now known as Fox Channel 5) set up shop on the upper floors and in 1946 began broadcasting about 20 hours of programming a week. The popular and pioneering Milt Grant Show, a daily dance party featuring local teenagers and a virtual Who's Who of national stars, was transmitted live from the WTTG studios between 1956 and 1961.

A radio station found a home in the Harrington as well. In 1953 Washington's "Good Music Station," WGMS-AM and FM, moved into what a reporter described as "new and more sumptuous guarters" in the hotel. The station offered Washingtonians the finest in classical music, including live concert broadcasts of the Library of Congress chamber series, National Gallery of Art Orchestra, and National Symphony. WTTG moved to upper Northwest DC in 1962, and WGMS followed in 1965.

In 2014, the Hotel Harrington continues to welcome travelers and school groups, many with loyalty dating back decades, from around the globe. The Harrington remains a family business, in the hands of third-, fourth-, and fifth-generation descendants of the founders. Ann Terry, Managing Director since 1986, looks forward to taking the Hotel Harrington into its second 100year run as "Washington DC's Tourist Hotel."

One of the disadvantages of my job is I **have** to travel a lot. One of the big advantages of my job is I **get** to travel to a lot of places that have great car museums and venues. Earlier this year, I was in San Francisco, one of my favorite US destinations, and stumbled upon a GREAT car museum – the Academy of Art University Auto Museum.



Van Ness Avenue in San Francisco has a long history of classic car dealerships and distributorships. It was the home of the original Don Lee distributorship for Cadillac in Northern California, and the original art deco building, complete with its 1920's Cadillac logo still exists, although it is now a multiscreen AMC movie theatre. The Earl C. Anthony Packard distributorship, built in 1927, is also still standing at 901 Van Ness Ave., now a Jaguar dealership.

For many years, Cadillac was represented by George Olsen Cadillac at 999 Van Ness Avenue, a beautiful 1930's Art Deco building that now houses a Bentley dealership. (Sadly, there are no longer any Cadillac dealers on Van Ness.)

So Van Ness Avenue is always a destination for me when I'm in San Fran. While heading south on Van Ness from Lombard St. (the famous wiggly street on the hill), imagine my surprise to see out of the corner of my eye the all too familiar image of a 1948 Cadillac tail light inside one of the old dealership buildings. I quickly circled around the block to come back to a showroom that had dozens of classics, with a sign out front for the Academy of Art University Auto Museum, which was unfamiliar to me.

The Academy of Art Museum is, as its name implies, a degreed institution teaching and supporting art. The founder, Richard A. Stephens, always felt auto design was an important venue of artistic expression. As such, he amassed a very impressive collection of Classic (with a capital "C") cars that represent milestones in automotive design.





The collection is partially housed and displayed for the public in a 1930's Chrysler Plymouth dealership at the intersection of Washington St. and Van Ness. Here you will see "Olympian" cars spanning Auburn, Bugatti, Stutz, Minerva, Duesenberg (five examples), Packard, Cadillac, Hispano Suiza, Marmon, Pierce Arrow, Cord, Rolls Royce, Mercedes, Lagonda, Delage,

Talbot Lago, Delahaye, Ruxton, and Ferrari. Domestics are well represented by Buick, Ford, Lincoln, Oldsmobile, Mercury, Chrysler, etc. It is an *incredible* collection.

You have to schedule an appointment for the only times during the week the museum is open to the general public: Tuesday mornings and Thursday afternoons. I was able to move my schedule around to visit on a Thursday afternoon. The docent, Paul Borgwardt, is a CLC member in Northern California who owns a '47 60S and a '67 DeVille Convertible, so he was very friendly to me and welcomes other CLC visitors. For a \$10 donation (to the Boys and Girls Clubs), you have the run of the museum.

Here's a list of Cadillacs in the collection: '30 V-16 Roadster, '31 V8 Roadster, '34 V-16 Aero Coupe, '37 V-12 Custom Series 85 Coupe, '40 Series 75 Open Front Town Car, '41 60S and 62 Convertible, '48 Convertible, '49 Coupe DeVille, '59 Eldorado Biaritz, and a '66 Fleetwood Brougham. Every one of these vehicles is restored to a very high "Pebble Beach" level.

The only thing that seemed to be missing (and may be stashed somewhere else) were any LaSalles. Certainly the '27 and '34/'35 LaSalles would make the cut of this "who's who" in great classic auto design.

"CADILLAC ESCALADE" SPOTTED ALONG THE ROAD BY SANDY KEMPER

Lately I have noticed some small four, six or eight passenger vehicles zooming around the streets of various cities. With small wheels, open sides and roof canopies, they look like "extended cab" golf carts. In Baltimore, for example, these battery-powered carts shuttle passengers from certain bars and restaurants in the Federal Hill neighborhood to and from Orioles Park at Camden Yards. Usually, these carts are non-descript. That is, there is no distinctive styling to the fiberglass body panels, the roof canopy, or the wheels. They lack any identification of the manufacturer of the vehicle or even the sponsoring restaurant. So imagine my surprise and enthusiasm for one that I spotted parked near a popular restaurant and nightspot in Sea Isle City, a resort town at the New Jersey shore. As I approached the cart, the first thing I noticed was that the wheels were automobile size in the design of a Cadillac Escalade, including the Cadillac emblem. Then I noticed that the front cowl was styled exactly like an Escalade too. The seats appeared to be leather and the interior was trimmed with chrome and wood-like accents. I was able to take a photo with an older-style cellular phone. But the image doesn't show the detail of this luxury cart.


Later I discovered that the Cadillac Escalade golf cart is manufactured by American Custom Golf Cars, Inc. The firm is licensed by Cadillac to produce these "golf/estate" vehicles. (See: <u>http://acgcars.us/cadillac-escalade-golf-car.html</u>.) They are built with standard features normally found on automobiles like, "standard headlights, brake lights, turn signals, horn and [it] is the only golf cart to feature a standard 4-wheel braking system, which includes the use of front wheel hydraulic disc brakes." There are many options available also. What fun!
