I'M NOT A PRESIDENTIAL LINCOLN LIMOUSINE...BUT I PLAY ONE ON TV BY BREWSTER THACKERAY PHOTOS BY BREWSTER THACKERAY AND <u>IN THE SECRET SERVICE</u>

The call from Vince Taliano was right up my alley – a documentary film group with Fox News was looking for a vintage limousine, and Vince thought my black 1992 Brougham Limousine Werks 60inch stretch could fit. The opportunity sounded wonderful, though the event turned out to be rather chilling: a 40th anniversary recreation of the 1981 assassination attempt on President Ronald Reagan.

I recall that day. I was 11 years old, and terrified to learn that our newly-inaugurated president had been shot. This was less than three months since John Lennon had been murdered. As the news of another shooting spread that March 30, nobody could say if Reagan was going to survive.



After college, I moved to Washington and remember the first time attending an event at the very distinctive Hilton hotel where the shooting occurred. Later I worked for the National Organization on Disability, which Reagan's Press Secretary, Jim Brady, who was badly and permanently wounded by a bullet from John Hinckley, Jr.'s gun, served on our Board.



When explaining to the documentary producer, Kayvon Afshari, that I did not own a 1972 Presidential Lincoln limousine, he assured me that after weeks of looking, Vince's lead was the best one he'd had for an older car. At least the center part of my car was periodcorrect for Reagan's Presidency; and the car was similarly boxy to

the one in question. What my car does not have is "suicide" rear doors – the 1972 Lincoln limousine did, even though those doors had ended their run on standard Lincoln sedans.

I enjoyed talking about the events with the producer, and as a history buff, I went the extra mile. I found and printed Lincoln emblems to put on the hood, trunk, and wheels of the car in case they showed in the film. I also found online photos of the original 1981 Inauguration #1 plate that adorned Reagan's limousine. Since it had sold for an amazing \$14,000 at auction, I did not buy the plate, but I printed out color copies and taped them over my regular plates.





Then I offered the producer a bonus. My other Cadillac, recently featured in the *Caddie Chronicle*, is an Innsbruck Blue 1976 Sedan DeVille. It happens that the secret service car that accompanied Reagan's limousine to the hotel that fateful day was a similar, then-five-year-old Cadillac. It is shown in a photo of the aftermath (see page 10). They liked the idea, so we used this as the chase car (see my Cadillacs below). I put flashing red bicycle lights behind the grill and a flashing emergency light on the dash, and mounted vintage DC license plates.





Finally, I recruited two friends to join me as Secret Service agents. Gordon McCracken is one of very few people I trust to drive my limo. Darrell Duane joined me as an agent in the chase car. Darrell and I both shaved our beards down to mustaches to fit the look of the period (pictured left). The day of the shoot dawned cool, overcast, and damp – exactly like the day Reagan was shot. We could not have gotten more fortunate on the weather. We also were fortunate that the hotel was shut. There is no way we could have filmed as readily otherwise.





We did a number of on-site takes, with an agent pushing "Reagan" (for some takes played by yours truly) into the car, then groping me in search of any bullet wounds. Then we drove the route, from the hotel down Connecticut Avenue to Pennsylvania Avenue. The road was already closed on that day in 1981, in anticipation of the Presidential motorcade. After the bullets flew,

the initial plan was to rush Reagan back to the White House, until he began to spit blood and the agents realized he was injured. They diverted to George Washington University Hospital, a fortuitous choice as they had a new, state of the art trauma unit. Reagan walked into the hospital under his own power and then collapsed. He was in grave condition.

As we drove two cars with flashing lights through the streets of Washington, D.C., it occurred to me – what if someone with no clue about cars and age thought we were a real Presidential motorcade? What if someone rushed or attacked my cars? People pointed and stared but thankfully, no wouldbe assassins were on the streets.

Reagan was walking out of a speech he had given to an AFL-CIO gathering at 2:27 PM on March 30, 1981. He later shared that his plan had been to stand on the car's door sill and wave to the small crowd that had gathered to see him. Had Hinckley waited for that he would have had a clear shot at Reagan's head. Instead, he jumped the gun and fired six shots, wounding Brady and two others (pictured left). The sixth shot is said to have ricocheted off the bullet proof Lincoln (it would have penetrated a normal car), then bounced off the bulletproof window, and entered Reagan's body under his arm (although he often wore a bullet proof vest, that day he did not). It lodged an inch from his heart. His life was very much and truly endangered. He spent more than a week in the

hospital and the world was shaken by how close the would-be assassin came to success. Reagan kept good spirits during his recovery, famously telling his wife, "Honey, I forgot to duck." His popularity surged as the nation rallied around its stricken leader.

It was a fascinating opportunity to take part in the recreation of this historic day. My Cadillacs emerged unscathed and with some credits for their resumes. Look for the Fox News documentary to air on or around March 30.





RUNNING THE RAILS: MODIFIED CADILLAC RESTORED TO TRAVEL ON THE TRACKS BY ANTHONY GAYNOR <u>THE INTER-MOUNTAIN</u> JULY 11, 2020 REPRINTED WITH PERMISSION



Self-Starter magazine, the article titled "Cadillac Rides the Rails" featured the story of the Western Maryland Railroad's (WMR) use of modified Cadillacs as rail cars. They were used by railroad employees to inspect tracks, transfer train crews and carry train workers. According to Jerry Miller's article in the **Blue** Mountain Express in the Spring/Summer of 1991, "someone in Western Maryland management during the 1930s must have had a weakness for Cadillacs." They had at least five and possibly six V-8 Cadillac sedans. In early 1946, the WMR purchased 17 assorted highway vehicles to "handle men and material over highways eliminating delays and expediting work," according to their documentation. Included in this group was a five-passenger Cadillac Sedan to be used as an Official Car. By 1955, the 1946 Cadillac was "no longer appropriate for official use" and converted to Rail Motor Car #6 in 1956 for a total of \$500.00. It was retired in 1968 and sold. #6 was purchased by the Museum from the estate of John J. Warfield of Washington, D.C.]

ELKINS — A West Virginia Railroad Museum project years in the making is coming to fruition and soon a 1946 Cadillac Rail Car may be running on local railroad tracks.

The car took a trip down the rail lines for the first time in decades on July 3. "On Friday (July 3), we had the engine and transmission finished," he said. "It ran under its own power." He said a volunteer who assisted on the project made adjustments to the transmission before the vehicle was ready to roll. "It made a couple trips from the depot (Elkins Depot Welcome Center) to the old mill (the Darden Mill) to test it out," he said.

Schoonover noted one of the main chores left is to rewire the car's electrical systems. He said the car was converted from using a 6-volt battery to a 12– volt system. The car's interior has been re-upholstered. "Most of the pieces for the external chrome, we have found," he said. "We still need some items."

The goal is to restore the vehicle to its 1956 condition, as opposed to the original 1946 condition, so it will still be operational on the rails. "The car was originally an executive car for the railroad in 1946," Schoonover said. "In 1956, the railroad took the car and another '46 Cadillac — that we have — and converted them for rails only."





When the car was decommissioned in 1956 for highway use by the WMR, it was transported to Hagerstown, MD. While there, the vehicle was made to steer using the tracks. Additional modifications made to the car were to put sanders on it for traction when starting and stopping, a compressor was placed under the hood that runs off the V8 engine and an air ringer bell was installed.

"When the car had originally been put on rails, they put a turntable under the car so it could be jacked up and turned around," Schoonover said. "A turntable will be fabricated by the Durbin & Greenbrier Valley Railroad in their shop."

The turntable allows one person to turn the car around, and when the turntable is installed it must be directly in the center of the car. Schoonover said the original car featured air conditioning, but it was removed and the pump for compressed air was used for an air horn and the ringer bell.

"We are putting a compressor in the back of the car and will use that to blow the big air horn on top of the car and we will be able to ring the bell," he said.

Schoonover said the car was gifted to the museum by Durbin & Greenbrier Valley Railroad (D&GVR) President John Smith more than a decade ago. The opportunity came about thanks to some tourists from Iowa who took a ride on the Durbin Rocket train. They told Smith they knew of a salvage company in their home state that had the rail car. Smith purchased the vehicle and it was later given to the museum.

WMR sold the car in the late 1960s to a small railroad company in Iowa. While it was there it was pushed on the tracks and was damaged in an accident. "We purchased a donor car and that is where we got the stuff for the front end," Schoonover said.

So far \$72,000 has been spent on the restoration and it is expected the cost to finish the restoration will run from \$4,000 to \$5,000. Schoonover said

the museum has raised about \$30,000 for the restoration and the project is running a deficit of about \$45,000. "We would love to have donations," Schoonover said. "Any donations would be greatly appreciated."





He noted the restoration project would have been much more difficult without the assistance of Museum board member Bryan Totten and local businessman Brad Curtis. "The bulk of the work was inspired by Bryan Totten," Schoonover said. He saw the vehicle in storage in Beverly. In March 2019, it was hauled to Curtis' body shop, where all the body work was completed.

When the car is finished, the Museum plans to enter into a partnership with the D&GVR so the car can be used as a tourist attraction and visitors will be able to ride in the classic machine.

[April 2021 Update: COVID-19 delayed the Museum's progress on the project for nearly a year. As mentioned in the article, approximately \$72,000 was spent on the restoration including the extensive body work needed before painting it and the rechroming. Other completed work included rebuilding the

engine and transmission and purchasing a myriad of parts such as windows, weather-stripping, new radiator, etc., plus re-upholstering the interior.

Fabrication is still needed to complete the project including the turntable, which will be fitted to frame of the car, and the arm rests in the back seat. Also, the wiring and installation of the air compressor need to be finished. The Museum now estimates the remaining costs will be approximately \$10,000, so donations would be greatly appreciated. NBC'S \$62,000 1952 CADILLAC BY LARRY GOOD





Studying Ike's 1953 inaugural parade, I found a picture of NBC's \$62,000 1952 Cadillac, just in front of the Jeep, with mounted cameras that was used to televise the event live (pictured left). Many parade pictures don't show the camera car.

A few magazine articles were published on the Cadillac in 1953, including one in *Popular Mechanics* (pictured below left). A March 1953 story in *Electrical Engineering* stated "it had a crew of five: the driver (who also operated a hand-held camera at stops along the parade route), the cameraman and microwave operator on the roof and an announcer and broadcast technician in the back seat. The dish portion of the microwave transmitter is missing in this photo. The unit transmitted to a receiver location on the dome of the U.S. Capitol."

It's a thrill to realize that I'm studying my own life. I watched live coverage of the 1953 inauguration when I was eight years old with no idea then that parade images were coming from a mobile station created in a 1952 Cadillac that cost \$62,000 (10 times as much today).

Half the cars in Ike's parade cluster were Cadillacs. That means a lot to CLC members because we are all a group of automotive historians focusing on this marque.

Another website had a forum with an interesting post by Bill Parinello, six years and eight months ago. "We used the Cadillac at the New Brunswick, NJ railroad station for Robert Kennedy's funeral in 1968. The body was transported by train from New York to Washington, D.C. We were on the air for as long as it took the train to slow down to pass through the station."
