
I hope to see many of you at events in the coming months.

CLC Potomac Region charter member Akin T. Davis of Washington, D.C. passed away on February 10, 2021 at the age of 95. He and his late wife, Cari, were in attendance at the Region's first meeting held in January 1969 at Ron & Sherie VanGelderen's house (pictured top left). He owned many unusual and unique classic cars over his life including two V-16 Cadillacs, including the 1934 Cadillac V-16 Convertible Sedan by Fleetwood pictured below, a 1941 Cadillac Series 60 Special Sedan with Sunshine Turret Top, a 1941 Cadillac Series 62, a 1936 Bentley 4-1/4 litre, a one-off 1946 Bentley drophead, a 1958 Rolls Royce Silver Cloud and numerous other unique non-classics.








According to RM Auctions, Akin purchased this 1934 V-16 Convertible Sedan from Fred F. Betz III (the car's original owner was Edith du Pont Riegel). In 1952, he sold the car to Roy Licari of Alexandria, VA. In 2013, the car sold for \$825,000 at the RM Auction in Phoenix, AZ. View more pictures and history of the car.

Akin served in the US Army late in WWII in Okinawa and subsequently in Japan in the early months of the occupation. He again served in the Army during the Korean War and was stationed in Japan. It is planned that Akin will be interred at Arlington National Cemetery later this year (thanks for your service!).

Following his military service, he obtained a degree in Chemical Engineering from the University of Delaware and worked for E.I. du Pont Company at the Savannah River Plant in Aiken, SC, an atomic energy installation concerned with the production of plutonium and tritium. He later returned to Washington, D.C. and attended George Washington Law School while employed as a U.S. Patent Examiner. He joined the intellectual property law firm of Cushman, Darby & Cushman and retired as a partner after 28 years.


As an avid member of the Classic Car Club of America, the Rolls-Royce Owners Club, the Bentley Drivers Club, the Antique Automobile Club of America and former member of the Cadillac & LaSalle Club, he could always be found at club gatherings, and on driving tours and caravans. His travel planning always centered around taking the roads less traveled as it was the journey that provided the experience.



Two of his great loves in life were antique cars and road trips around the country, which he documented extensively with photographs and handwritten notes. In addition, he was well versed in the Civil War history of Washington D.C., Maryland, Pennsylvania and Virginia.

Always passionate about nature and old growth forests, his road trips included visiting the majority of the U.S. National Parks across the country and he was planning another road trip in 2021 to visit the remaining National Parks on his bucket list.

Akin was preceded in death his wife, Cari, parents and three brothers. He is survived by his sons Christopher (Deborah) of Pittsburgh, PA, Garrett of Silver Spring, MD and Graham (Kathleen) of Keswick, VA; eight grandchildren and twelve great grandchildren, whom he adored. RIP, Mr. Davis.





IN MEMORIAM: ROBERT J. CRIMMINS

Long-standing Potomac Region member Robert J. Crimmins of Manalapan, NJ passed away on Sunday, May 23, 2021 at the age of 84. Bob and Jeff Montgomery, both members of the Region, would routinely travel to our shows at Capitol Cadillac in Greenbelt, MD as well as other local events from time to time. They would also attend our post car show dinners before catching their northbound train home.

Bob was the CLC VP of Chapters and the Chair of the Publications Committee, where he managed the publication of *The Self-Starter*. He was also the author of the annual 25th and 50th Cadillac model year anniversary articles. He faithfully attended Grand Nationals and Winter Board Meetings for more years than anyone can remember. He is pictured below with Jeff beside him and other CLC dignitaries at the 2013 Grand National in Ouincy, MA.

Bob worked for the Herbert L. Farkas Company in Newark, NJ from 1963 to 2005, rising to VP of Sales, and then worked in sales at Hertz Furniture in Ramsey, NJ for a number of years before retiring.

He was very active and loved to travel and cruise, visiting almost 100 different countries, as well as 49 of the 50 states. He was a Titanic enthusiast and prolific model builder (his garage had many shelves of expertly assembled car models), but his true passion was classic Cadillacs.







At one time, he was the proud owner of three 1955 Cadillacs (still owned two at the time of his death plus a 1993 Fleetwood Brougham). Bob wrote a story about his 1955 Fleetwood 60 Special in the April 2005 *Caddie Chronicle* to celebrate the car's 50th anniversary (see page 6). In 2006, he attended the *Eldorado Extravaganza* car show at Capitol Cadillac with his stunning, red 1955 Eldorado (pictured right), where he won the Dealer's Choice award. In the July 2006 *Caddie Chronicle*, Bob wrote an article about the Eldorado being used for wedding photos with CLC members Lillian & Bill Nemcik's daughter's bridesmaids (photo by Chris Bossio). In addition, the car was used in the film *Cadillac Records* as Chuck Berry's car.

Despite the restrictions in place due to the pandemic, he continued to attend CLC events whenever possible. Pictured below right are Earl Rutter and Bob at the CLC Central Pennsylvania Region Car Show at the AACA Museum in August 2020 in Hershey, PA. Earlier this year Bob traveled to North Carolina to visit with Jason Edge, Tim Coy, Cynthia Rutledge and others for the remote CLC Winter Board Meeting, where they participated from Jason's Cadillac man cave.

"Cadillac Bob," as he was known by his legion of devoted friends, viewed life in the most positive and optimistic manner. His humor and jokes brought smiles to everyone he met. He was a superb conversationalist and close friends could always rely on him for encouraging words. Month after month he was one of the first to reply after receiving the *Caddie Chronicle*, offering thanks and positive remarks on the respective issues. A number of tributes have been posted on the internet. They may be viewed on the <u>CLC Forum</u>, <u>CLC Facebook</u> Group and Day Funeral Home websites.

Bob is survived by his wife of 62 years, Clara (nee Martin), three loving nieces and many great nieces and nephews. He was loved by all that knew him





and was everyone's friend. In lieu of flowers, consider a donation to the <u>CLC Museum and</u> <u>Research Center</u> in his name. Thanks for everything, Bob. RIP!





A FLEET OF '55 CADILLACS BY BOB CRIMMINS ORIGINALLY PUBLISHED IN APRIL 2005

[Editorial Note - Celebrating the 50th birthday of 1955 Cadillacs would not be complete without showcasing Bob Crimmins and his collection of 50-year-old beauties. He owns not one, not two, but three '55 Cadillacs. "Rosalind" is an Eldorado Convertible named after Rosalind Russell, "Ava" is a Coupe Deville named after Ava Gardner and "The Duchess" is a Fleetwood 60 Special].

I've owned "The Duchess" since July 1989 and a brief history is as follows:

She was built on Thursday, July 14, 1955 and shipped to Scott Smith Cadillac in Philadelphia, PA. Her first owner, Emma Smith, purchased her on August 29, 1955. I am the third owner since Mrs. Smith.

The car was furnished with most of the options available in 1955 and it was estimated it have sold for about \$6,000.

The odometer just turned 81,000 miles. It remains pretty much an original car, as the car has only been repainted and re-chromed.

"The Duchess" has been in several weddings, one movie (*Liberty Heights* – set in Baltimore) and





was used by both The Franklin Mint and Mattel for models commemorating the 25th anniversary of Elvis' death.

With a 133-inch wheelbase and a length of 227.3 inches, she rides like a dream - her almost 5,000 pounds ensures that "boulevard" ride.

Although there were 18,300 Fleetwoods produced in 1955, only 29 are registered with the Cadillac & LaSalle Club, making her a fairly rare car. Needless to say, she is a wonderful car and will always be one of my prized possessions.





As we and our beloved old cars age, things don't always work as they were originally designed! While I firmly believe our classics behave better when they are frequently driven, that also opens opportunities for things to go wrong.

Given the isolation demanded by COVID-19, we were blessed to have our old cars to go on "therapeutic" drives. Whenever I suffered from cabin fever, if the weather was good and there was no salt on the road, I'd jump in one of our oldies for a cleansing ride to nowhere. While these were relatively short trips, they did bring back memories of some of the mishaps we encountered over the years. Here's a few of them that we've experienced.

In the 10+ years my wife, Debbie, and I have owned our Marina Blue **1967 DeVille Convertible (aka "Big Blue")**, we've put over 30,000 miles on the car, including participation in four CLC Grand Nationals, one CLC National Driving Tour, six Miss America parades, and the Baltimore-based NFL Hall-of Fame Parade for Ray Lewis. We've gone as far north as Boston and Lake George NY, and as far west as Louisville. Big Blue also takes us out to coffee, dinner, and for ice cream. But we've had our share of "adventures" while on the road, most of them self-inflicted and not the fault of the car.

MISHAP #1

In 2011, Big Blue's chassis was completely restored, including all new suspension components. By 2014, we had driven to two CLC Grand Nationals and countless other regional events in the surrounding states, having put about 15K miles on the car. One afternoon in December 2014, we took the car out to lunch. As we were returning home, while driving at 50 MPH on Route 40 within about a half mile of our house, the entire left front of the car collapsed, making a horrendous noise with a lot of smoke and the odor of burning rubber. I was able to get the car safely off the road on the left shoulder, and got out to find our left front ball joint had collapsed, with the left front wheel protruding out from the fender at a 90-degree angle. OUCH!!

The car was towed to our local shop – not an easy feat to get it winched up on a roll-back! Further inspection showed the left front ball joint had come loose because the cotter pin was missing from the securing crown nut. When we looked at the other ball joint, it too was missing the cotter pin and was dangerously close to letting go itself. Damage to the car was surprisingly light – the lower control arm was bent, the near-new Diamond Back radial was fried because it had taken all the drag force of the car, and the fender was bent out because of the tire. The bumper brackets were slightly bent because they hit the ground (fortunately grass, and not the road.) It turns out that when the new ball joints were installed, we neglected to secure them with the cotter pins. I could get angry about this, except at least two other shops and I had done suspension inspections before long trips and completely whiffed on the fact the cotter pins were missing!

MIRACLE

When I think about the approximately 15K miles we put on Big Blue without cotter pin-secured ball joints, and the fact it waited to let go until I was within a half mile of our house, that was a MIRACLE! In 2013, we had followed Scot Minesinger in his '70 DeVille Convertible 400 miles to the CLC Grand National in Quincy, MA – trying to keep up with Scot at 75+MPH in a driving rain storm (and hitting submerged pot holes on the George Washington Bridge!). Also we were doing 70-80 MPH on the New York State Thruway on the way to the CLC Grand National in Lake George, NY in 2014. What a disaster this could have been – we were so, so lucky!!

MISHAP #2

In 2015, while returning from the shop, I was driving Big Blue in the slow lane on the outer loop of the Capital Beltway, Interstate 495, behind a huge dually pick-up truck. The driver appeared to be on the phone and occasionally drifted toward the right-side shoulder. All of a sudden, he went completely onto the shoulder and his big dual rear tires ran over a hub cap sending it spinning like a Frisbee right into the front of Big Blue. It then cascaded clear over my car and hit a Honda that was behind me. The Honda and I pulled off. His windshield was broken. I had a huge 3" gash in the front nose of the hood on the '67.

MIRACLE

This could have been much worse, especially if it had hit my windshield. As it was, Hagerty Insurance paid to have my hood repaired and clear-coated.

MISHAP #3

A week after the car was repaired, Debbie and I took Big Blue to our favorite local winery, Elk Run, in Eldersburg. On the 20-mile outbound ride, a car pulled out and hit some loose gravel and a stone hit the freshly painted nose of the hood, resulting in a big ugly chip. Debbie suggested I leave it alone, because as soon as I had it fixed again, it would get another stone chip.

MIRACLE

Not this time. As I write this, the chip is still there, along with two others I've picked up over the years.





MISHAP #4

While leaving the show field at the 2019 City of Rockville show with Christopher Winter in the car, a sudden puff of smoke came out from under the front of the hood of Big Blue. Instantly, my generator dash light (for the alternator) came on. We popped the hood to discover that the supply wire from the alternator to the battery was not only completely fried, but burnt off! If I had driven further onto the road, it may have resulted in a fire. Fortunately, there was still enough day light to drive home on the battery (with alternator disconnected), after which I could get the battery recharged and drive Big Blue to the shop for repair.

MIRACLE

If this had happened at night, at best case I would have been stuck, and worst case I would have had a fire in the dark. Also, this occurred the week before the 2019 CLC National Driving Tour in Gettysburg, PA, where a 900+ mile tour was planned. I was able to get a new supply wire and get an insulated grommet where we believe the short originated. We ended up having a very successful and enjoyable tour.

The moral to these stories is there is always a happy ending. I highly recommend my fellow car nuts to get out there and drive your cars as much as you can. I can't keep the smile off my face every time I get behind those big old steering wheels.

Here's hoping we can enjoy many miles and smiles in 2021!!

P.S. Make sure your ball joints have the cotter pins installed!

WEST COAST '53 ELDORADO ADVENTURES BY LARRY GOOD

After becoming fully vaccinated, my wife, Maia, and I recently took a trip to the West Coast to be with family. It gave me another opportunity to meet with fellow 1953 Eldorado owners. First on April 15 was Dave Ventresca in Los Angeles, owner of #337. Dave, who just retired from a career as a high school math teacher, spent 18 years restoring this Eldorado himself.

The paint and bodywork are perfect, better than factory. They meet and exceed my standards, and I used to do this work for concours restorations! The car has the tinted glass factory option but not the Autronic Eye, reputed to be a lemon. Dave also has a right-hand mirror, a dealer option.

Dave took us for a spin on the freeway. Just the week before he found out that the dice hanging from his mirror are now illegal in California (pictured right). What next?!

The car's interior is red and white (trim code #38) per the build sheet. When restoring the upholstery, he even made sure the thread colors were correct (pictured below right).

Dave's attention to detail is so deep that he has the A.O. Smith Corp. (AOS) branding stenciled on the chassis they built (pictured below). He also has an extra pair or two of NOS exhaust tips. I told him if they were mine, I'd never put them on a car. I'd keep them on a museum shelf. On a car they'd just burn up and rust – labels, paint and all.















Here is a picture of the NOS wiper motor on #337 with its unique Eldorado part number, CPH 10-21, rubber stamped by the TRICO factory, and is usually hard to see. Correctly stamped wiper motors are nearly impossible to find these days. Next to the motor is a functioning Electro-Vac booster pump, usually missing or disconnected on Eldorados now.

After visiting with Dave, we took the train up the California coast to see more family and more Eldorados in Silicon Valley. The good news was that we "discovered" a new '53 Eldorado in the San Francisco Bay area, body #35. Actually, the car was in plain view for many years, but the CLC never

knew its number. No. 35 appears nowhere in <u>The (New) Cadillac Database</u>. Pictured below left is its owner, Jim Zanardi (center), along with me and Maia.








Then we were able to see three more cars in three days: Thursday #203, Friday #2 and Saturday #263. Pictured above is the owner of #203, Larry Camuso (left), and me with his Eldorado. Pictured left is Dan McNamara (right) and me with his Eldorado, #263.

1953 Eldorado #2 is the one that transported President Eisenhower during his inauguration parade. It is currently at the Lee collection near Reno, NV. The owner, Anne Brockinton Lee, invited me to visit, so I rented a car and drove there.









I confirmed it was indeed #2 by its body tag on the firewall and serial number on the engine (pictured above). Ms. Lee was out of town during my visit, but I will try to contact her later and do a phone interview.






The first build sheet for this car says it was shipped to Capitol Cadillac Olds Co. in Washington, D.C. on January 16, 1953, in "condition for inaugural parade," which occurred four days later. This build sheet also says "cars in co. use," which tells me it was not for sale. The next document I found is called Return for Credit Notice, dated August 11, 1953. The notice says "Returned from...Factory." I don't understand this point since the car was in Washington. Then it lists "Reason for return...Show Car." With "show car" status, it would not be sold. That changed with the next build sheet, which dispatched #2 to New York on August 26 for sale.

These California Eldorados will get more exposure in future articles and in the 1953 Eldorado Survivors Roster in The (New) Cadillac Database. I am working on a full article about Eldorado #2 to submit to **The Self-Starter**. The research continues.





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
