



JUNE 20, 2022 MEETING MINUTES BY DAN RUBY AND VINCE TALIANO



We will gather at the AACA Museum, Hershey, PA, on Saturday, August 20. A concession will be available from 11:30 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. to





buy lunch or eat beforehand / bring your own. Unique depictions of scenes representing New York, Route 66, San Francisco and other famous American settings provide the background for 71,000 square feet of exhibit space, featuring classic and vintage cars, buses, trucks, motorcycles, and model trains. This year's special exhibit features *Orphan Cars*. You can tour the museum virtually by visiting their website and clicking on *Virtual Visits*.

The museum is open for self-guided tours on Saturday and Sunday. Due to a Mustang show taking place on Saturday, tours of the detail/maintenance shop, and storage building (Jim's Place) are not available. Visitors are welcome to stroll the grounds, admire fellow CLC members' cars, and walk around the Mustang show field. After the tours, we will travel as a group to one or two local, highly recommended restaurants for dinner. We will arrange for separate checks for each party in the group(s). Out-of-towners may reserve a hotel room for the night at one of several hotels close to the museum.

Please note there are no host hotels, room blocks or group rates for this event. AAA, AARP, or Military/Government discounts may be available. Reserve your room(s) as soon as possible, as August is peak of tourist season at Hershey. Hotels close to the Museum:

ANOTHER BROTHERS ROAD TRIP BY CHUCK PIEL

As I have written previously, my younger brothers and I like to take "Brothers Road Trips" from time to time. David, who is also a car guy, and I more frequently take these trips. On the spur of the moment, after getting an invite from the local Classic Car Club of America (CCCA) chapter, we took one of our trips up to New Freedom, PA on Saturday, April 30.

This trip was to <u>Treasured Motorcars Services</u> (TMS). They hosted an open house to celebrate a recent addition to their facilities. We drove my '41 Cadillac convertible coupe on the trip and had a pleasant drive via the Baltimore Beltway and I-83 North for the most part. During the trip, we encountered a stretch of I-83 that had just been milled, and traffic was spewing clouds of dust. However, it was the moron driving a Charger Hellcat doing 30 mph faster than everyone else throwing up all kinds of gravel chips and debris that really got our ire. Thankfully, no damage was suffered because of that idiot.

Because the invite to this open house came via the CCCA, I expected to see a lot of classic era cars, but we were surprised that our '41 was the oldest participating car, except for a few '30s street rods. There was an eclectic mix of vehicles, spanning a nearly new McClaren (pictured right) to a '51 Plymouth resto-mod to even some motorcycles. We were parked between a 1980 Rolls-Royce Silver



Shadow (last year for that model) and a 1969 MGB-GT.

We were also greeted by a familiar face. It turns out that the General Manager is Jack Anderson, a fellow member of the Vintage Chevrolet Club of America and certified auto appraiser. Jack attended one of the Capitol Cadillac car shows some years back.








We were immediately impressed with TMS' facilities, particularly the cleanliness (pictured above). The first car we encountered was a '66 Corvette L79 with the body and engine off the frame. Jack explained this car was purchased and appeared to be rust free, but upon very close inspection, rust was found in the "bird cage" frame section which serves as the foundation for the fiberglass panels. New steel was used to repair it and the frame was completely restored, including the A.O. Smith stenciling. The numbers matching L79 engine was rebuilt and in the wrapper, awaiting installation on assembly of the car.



We also encountered a beautiful all black 1980 Ferrari 308 GTS that is regularly serviced at TMS. A lot of mechanical and cosmetic work had been done over the years. We saw a '67 Austin Healey 3000 in for general restoration work, as well as a 1949 Chrysler Town & Country convertible, a 1951 Lincoln Cosmopolitan convertible, and a 1950 Packard Victoria convertible. There was also a very original '51 Ford Woody in for some electrical work (pictured left). A 1971 'Cuda was having a complete rebuild and was awaiting metal work on the floors, eventually leading to a full bare metal repaint.





The one CCCA car we saw, which was probably the most impressive, was a 1933 Rolls-Royce saloon with Gurney-Nutting coach work that was breathtakingly beautiful (pictured right). It is a true CCCA classic. Jack explained this car had some damage to the roof that had been repaired by another shop that didn't meet the owner's standards, so it was brought in to TMS for a redo.

Jack emphasized that TMS a full-service shop, with a particular specialty in all kinds of mechanical work. We noticed a lot of metal fabrication machinery, so it seems they can make a lot of 'unobtanium' small parts.

After the tour, Dave and I looked at the other cars attending. Sadly, there were no Cadillacs (other than mine), but a few other cars caught my attention. One was a '51 Plymouth Concord Fastback that was a resto-mod to replicate a Mexican Road Race-era car. This car had a transplanted 331 CI DeSoto Hemi engine from the mid-fifties and was painted satin black. There is nothing like the rumble of a vintage Hemi.

Another notable car was a '58 Impala painted in a beautiful Silver Blue Metallic, a true factory date-code color. This car was the restoration product of two separate cars over a period of five years and featured the iconic three-tone upholstery and a 348 CI engine. This one was special to David and me as our grandfather received an early '58 Impala as a birthday gift from our grandmother. We had many rides with "Pop" in that car, including one to the dealership where his best friend was Jack Seymour, the owner of Seymour Chevrolet in Owings Mills MD. I know there are many fans of the "Tri-Five" Chevys of 1955-57, but my favorite is the '58.



As a motorcycle enthusiast, David was drawn to a '94 Honda VFR800 (pictured left), a bike like one owned by our youngest brother, James, back in the day. This was a street-legal racing bike, and the owner had the racing leathers to prove it.

TMS arranged for a local food truck, and the food was excellent and very reasonably priced. As things wound down, we decided to take the back roads home to avoid I-83 and more road-milling dangers. It was a great trip. We can't wait for their next open house.






2022 NATIONAL MEMORIAL DAY PARADE BY TOM ALSOP



I had the honor to participate in the 2022 National Memorial Day Parade in Washington, D.C., along with my 1936 Cadillac Series 85 V-12 Convertible Sedan. It is a tradition carried forward from my late father, Byron Alsop. We were one of four cars, including a 1941 Series 67 Imperial Sedan, that transported World War II veterans who served as honorary grand marshals. Our veteran was 98 years old and was honored along with his wife. It was the first National Memorial Day Parade in two years and was well attended. The crowd applauded and thanked the veterans as we slowly drove by. It was a very rewarding experience.

It is about a 10-hour drive from my home in Beaufort, SC to Washington, D.C. The drive in a diesel truck pickup and trailer was exhausting, but well worth it. I was very fortunate to have two members of a local car club, Rick Larson and James Kamppi, assist with the parade preparations. They helped prepare the trailer that has been sitting for a few years and came along on the trip to Washington, D.C. Potomac Region member Bob Norrid suggested staying at the Dulles Marriott as it is one of the few hotels with ample parking for a truck and trailer measuring 58 feet. The hotel management and security were very accommodating and reserved space for us.



ANOTHER '53 ELDORADO FOR IKE: THE DEFIANCE ELDORADO BY LARRY GOOD

There is another "Eisenhower Eldorado" that nobody seems to be aware of. We all know about President Dwight Eisenhower's first inauguration parade car, Cadillac Eldorado #2. But presidents ride in many motorcades, and it stands to reason that he would get more than one chance to ride in America's top luxury car. It happened. Late in 1953 an Eldorado once again carried President Eisenhower, this time to a college ceremony in Ohio. Strangely, it's never been publicized.

On October 15, 1953, Ike visited the very small town of Defiance, OH (pop. \sim 12,000). The purpose was to lay the cornerstone for the Anthony Wayne Library for American Studies (now Hubbard Hall) at Defiance College (enrollment \sim 500). Getting a sitting U.S. president to visit here was a *very* big deal because the town and the college were so small. Tens of thousands of people came from the whole northwestern corner of Ohio to see Ike.

At 11:28 a.m. Eisenhower's special train arrived at the Defiance station. The reception delegation included the governor, a senator, the mayor and the college president.

Then Ike walked over to his ride fit for a king. The top car at the train station was the Cadillac Eldorado, America's most expensive production car that year. Parked right next to it was a '53 Oldsmobile Fiesta, scarcer than an Eldorado. Between the Eldorado and the Fiesta in the motorcade was a '53 Packard Caribbean, not chosen to carry the President.

The Defiance Automobile Dealers' Association had arranged to provide forty-some cars, most of them convertibles, for the motorcade traveling a two-mile route. That seems like a staggering number if, in fact, they were all used. How did they park at either end? Traffic jams posed a potential nightmare for the Secret Service.

On campus, Ike did his duty by speaking and setting the stone with his name on it. The college choir sang. The high school band played. What young musician would have missed that chance? Actually, the choir had already performed for Eisenhower more than once back in January in Washington at the Capitol for the inauguration and at an Eisenhower family event. So, part of the reason for Ike's visit to Defiance was a kind of payback.

In reality, Ike beat the clock. According to the Defiance Crescent-News, the special presidential train arrived at 11:28 a.m. and departed at 12:17 pm. It means that 49 minutes after he arrived, Ike got everything done and was out of there.

Press coverage of the event was curious. One journalist described the Eldorado as white, another yellow. In the photos we see, the car clearly looks Alpine White (code 27) with red and white trim (code 38). It must have been the other reporter's sunglasses.

Another curiosity surrounds the date for the event. The visit was originally scheduled for a month earlier, but Ike ditched it at the last minute. This caused Defiance College President Kevin McCann embarrassment because the community had spent a small fortune in preparation. They even lengthened the Defiance Airport runway, which the President didn't use. There are diverse explanations for the one-month delay.

According to the famous columnist Drew Pearson, Eisenhower reneged on his promise to stop at Defiance in September on his way back from Denver, stopping in Chicago instead to pick up his grandchildren. Kevin McCann then rushed to Washington to convince Ike to come back and make good on his promise a month later.

The *Defiance Crescent-News*, however, reported that the first ever Air Force One, a Lockheed Constellation, was too heavy for the Defiance Airport runway. Its pilot, Lt. Col. William Draper, ruled out the landing. When Ike finally made the trip a month later, he arrived on a train.

The grandchildren story sounds more heartwarming, but both reasons for the September cancellation may be true. Two railroads, the B&O and the Wabash, intersected in Defiance. The Wabash ran in a straight line to Toledo. In October the President arrived on a special, nine-car, overnight B&O train and left the next hour on a Wabash train for the Toledo Airport. We have train and car pictures but no plane pictures.

What could possibly attract a sitting U.S. president in the first place to leave the beaten path and visit Defiance, OH? The reason was friendship. President Eisenhower and Defiance College President McCann were good friends. Before they both became presidents of anything, McCann had been on General Eisenhower's staff as a speech writer and biographer. The biography helped get Ike elected. And this visit wasn't the last. After finishing his second term, Ike went to Defiance College again but in something else. By then, 1953 Eldorados were \$500 used cars, parked out in the weather, no longer welcome in motorcades.


The downside of this story is that we don't know the body number of the Defiance Eldorado for the Eldorado registry. Even with the same color combination, this could not have been body #2 that GM provided for the January inauguration. Cadillac released #2 to the NewYork Branch for public sale in August, two months before the event in Defiance. The late historian Matt Larson and the #2 owner's ID card both indicated that the car was sold privately in New York, not in western Ohio. Moreover, #2 had E-Z-Eye tinted glass, but the Defiance Eldorado did not. It had to be a different Eldorado that the Defiance Automobile Dealers' Association arranged in October for Ike.

By October 15, when this event occurred in Ohio, all 532 of the 1953 Eldorados had been produced, invoiced and shipped. Therefore, this one could have been any of the other 72 that Cadillac issued with a white body and red/white trim. We need a photo editor to remove the hood from these pictures and reveal the body tag on the firewall (just kidding). Or there could be one chance in a million that members of the Northwest Ohio Region of the Cadillac & LaSalle Club might be able to trace the local Cadillac history and discover the number. There are surely some Ohio residents still living who remember this event firsthand. If we get lucky, you will see an update.

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
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
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
