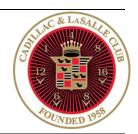

Before her detective could say anything, The Queen replied, "No, but Dick (her detective's name) knows her quite well." They even asked if she would take a photo of them with Dick. He in turn insisted they have a photo with his companion. There was also the instance where a policeman stopped a large chauffeur driven car because it had no license plates (The Queen's car doesn't need them). The chauffeur tried to indicate who was in the back, but there didn't seem to be anyone -The Oueen and Princess Anne had crouched down into the footwell.











The Queen had a welldocumented love of horses, but like us, she also liked to drive, from her earliest days driving military vehicles in WWII into her 90s when she could be seen driving her Jaguar or Range Rover around Windsor. She was as at home in the driving seat of an official Daimler as she was in her 1961 Vauxhall Cresta PA Friary Estate Car which she owned for several years. The license plate of that car (MYT 1) can still be seen on one of the Royal Range Rovers.

IN MEMORIAM: "HONEST JOHN" FOUST

It is with great sadness to report that <u>John Foust</u>, CLC #3277, from Justin, TX recently passed away at the age of 68, after a brief illness. John was the owner of "Honest John's Caddy Corner," which provided vintage Cadillac parts to collectors and restorers since 1982. In addition to selling parts, "Honest John" offered friendly advice to any hobbyist who contacted him. Most customers quickly became friends, including myself.

I first met him when looking for a correct heater for my 1956 Coupe Deville, a North Carolina car with neither heat nor air conditioning. After calling several Cadillac parts businesses, John said he could supply one from a '56 parts car he had. It turned out to be a complex process, shipping parts from Texas to West Virginia, where my car was located. It took several iterations and "back and forth" with my mechanic to get all the correct parts and get the heater working.

After the heater was successfully installed, I called him and mentioned the frequent business trips I made to Fort Worth, just south of Justin where his salvage yard was located. John mentioned that he went out to lunch every Friday with Alan, his employee, and invited me to come along next time I was in town. On my next trip I decided to take him up on the offer. While at lunch he talked to Alan at length about how I rated the invite because I had been such a nice guy and patient customer, never complaining about the delays and corrections that we had to make on the heater. I thought he was giving me a little too much credit on both fronts, but the food and company were both excellent, so what the heck! After that I would regularly find a way to "excuse" myself from work on Friday afternoons and make the half hour or so trek up FM 156 to Justin for lunch. We would head out to lunch in one of the vintage Cadillacs on the lot. John almost always took us to a different place, always good.

One trip was to Ranchman's Steakhouse just up the road in Ponder, TX. It had once been visited by Jimmy Carter's mother, Miss Lillian, and her picture and favorable review were posted on the wall. After lunch, John would usually drive around and show me some points of interest, or some of the apartments he rented out in Denton. I always offered to pay for lunch, but he wouldn't hear of it. Once I went to a movie with John, his wife Donna, and my (now) wife Maria. At least I was able to quietly buy us all popcorn and drinks, which John had to grudgingly accept!

"Honest John" had many connections in the Cadillac and business worlds. He served as a liaison to CLC international chapters in other countries and had numerous overseas friends. He supplied a Secret-Service driven Cadillac (pictured on page 4) used in the Oliver Stone movie **JFK**, and parts for the 1966 Cadillac driven by Brad Pitt (Cliff Booth) in the movie **Once Upon A**

Time In Hollywood.

John and Donna were regular attendees at CLC Grand National meets. Maria and I attended our first in 2016 in Las Vegas. We participated in the driving tour to the Valley of Fire with him and Donna in their 1974 Eldorado (he dubbed it a "pimpmobile" for the lavish accessories) they drove from Justin for the Meet. John made sure to introduce me to all his contacts in the CLC, which were many. He hung out with us at all the social functions and made sure we felt welcome.

There were plans for them to visit me at my house in West Virginia before the 2017 Grand National in Tysons Corner, VA, but unfortunately issues with one of his rental properties prevented that trip.

John ranks high on the list of the most good-hearted individuals I've ever known, always concerned about others and ready to help a friend in need. When I happened to be in Fort Worth on my 60th birthday, we went to lunch, of course, Then, he gave me several hard-to-find trunk and jack parts for my '56, refusing payment as usual. The parts helped turn my trunk from the worst feature of my car to the best.

I didn't have as much contact with John after the COVID-19 pandemic, as my business trips to Fort Worth dried up. Thankfully, however, I stopped in to see him while in Texas this past June. He was very busy, as the next day he was off to Germany for the <u>Grand European 2022</u> (watch interview starting at the 19:54 mark) where he was a judge and award donor. John served on the CLC National Board and was its first Director (now VP) of International Affiliates. As such, he



promoted the CLC worldwide, and encouraged Cadillac clubs in other countries to become affiliates of CLC. In 2019, the Club presented him with the prestigious International Activity Award in recognition of his notable contributions.

John seemed his usual self, taking one phone call after another for Cadillac parts and grousing good-naturedly about some of the clueless requests he would get. I had planned to get in touch with him again while in Texas in September but waited a bit too long. His untimely passing came as a terrible shock. Condolences go to Donna and the family. John will be missed by his many friends in the Club, and in the worldwide Cadillac community.



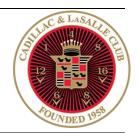



CADILLAC NOVELS AND MOVIES BY STEPHEN CLARK


Since October 2021, I have now amassed 125 books about Cadillacs and automobiles. Here is my latest review of six more Cadillac titled/themed novels.



Hearse of a Different Color by Tim Cockey. Fast paced murder mystery that takes place in Baltimore, MD. The main character is Hitchcock Sewell, an undertaker who seems to get involved in everything, and sometimes with his Cadillac hearse. For those familiar with Baltimore, there are many local places where the action takes place. 318 pages. ***** (One of five books by the author.)




The Hearse Case Scenario by Tim Cockey. A murder mystery with Hitchcock Sewell, who gets involved to try to protect his friend after he is charged with murder in a local Baltimore nightclub. Hitchcock's Cadillac hearse and daily driver, a Valiant, are also involved in the story. 417 pages. ***** Other books by the author are **The Hearse You Came in On, Murder in the Hearse Degree** and **Backstabber**. (Will read them and report back. Can't imagine them not being great as well.)




<u>Cadillac's Coming</u> by Mike Dennis. Takes place in 1958 in Memphis, TN and New Orleans, LA during the early days of rock-n-roll. Ike Thacker, a piano player, is about to make it big after releasing a hit single titled **Cadillac's Comin**, until a horrible and tragic accident changes everything. The story fast forwards to the 1980s with another musician's unfortunate circumstances. 375 pages. ****








Long Black Cadillac by BA Tortuga. Weird but interesting story about Vance, a vampire hunter, who is after Clay, a vampire living in the Louisiana swamps. There is a strange connection that Vance has never felt before. A long black Cadillac lurks behind the scenes. Adventurous but not for all readers. Takes place in southeast USA. 216 pages. ****



<u>Cadillac Cowboy, Diamond Lakes Texas</u> by Cynthia D'Alba. Love story involving a Chicago cop named Shade Gruber who agrees to drive his grandmother's Cadillac to her in Texas. On the way he picks up a runaway bride, Victoria Vaught, beginning an adventurous ride with several twists and turns. A quick read. 172 pages. ****



All I Ever Wanted Was a Piece of Cornbread and a Cadillac by Bo Whaley. Funny book divided into eight parts with short stories titled Why Me Lord?, From The Corners of My Mind, When Life Imitates Art and Rednecks and White Trash and Juke Joints, among others where he discusses almost everything. The author is a columnist from Dublin, GA and hosts a morning radio talk show. 191 pages. ***

Let's say you want Hollywood fame and glory. Would you let a vampire drive your Cadillac if that's what it took? It may be the only road home for my '47, which came with an old Hollywood registration card in the glove compartment. So, yes!

In July, a vampire got behind the wheel of my Series 61 Sedan in a film production in Frederick, MD, a suburb of Hollywood, CA. The movie, *El Vampiro*, is one in a collection of five shorts that together will make a feature length film set. The plot is about a vampire who parties too hard on Halloween and forgets about the time change to standard time. The sun is coming up an hour sooner than expected. His girlfriend races to save him. Their car gets stuck in a blind alley. The rest is a surprise, not to be divulged in the *Caddie Chronicle*. Watch the movie when it comes out.

I taught the star, Patricia Velasquez, how to drive the car for her driving scene. I hadn't done my homework, so I talked to her like she was a "normal" person, asking if she found it hard to make a living as an actress since many of them struggle. She said she was doing OK, but the uncertainty never goes away. She was very pleasant. The next day I looked her up and found she was already a star in the horror movie genre. Earlier, she was a super model, featured in a swimsuit issue of **Sports Illustrated**. If I'd known any of this, I might have stuttered through the driving lesson like Ralph Kramden ("Homina Homina").

On a movie set, the first thing you have to get used to is waiting. Every scene has at least a half dozen takes. You wait for long periods and learn to enjoy it. We got home at 4:00 a.m. but with no regrets. Pictured left to right waiting for a scene was my grandson Gabriel ("I'd rather be playing soccer."), me (Grandpa Larry) and Chad Horn, the producer and founder of Bard Tales Productions.

Director Ed Sanchez made <u>The Blair</u> <u>Witch Project</u>, one of the highest grossing independent movies ever, so **El Vampiro** has star power. My wife, Maia, talked with Ed for quite a while because he and our family have a common friend who worked on Blair Witch. Our Cadillac got into **El Vampiro** because Producer Chad Horn is friends with our son, Kevin, who is in the same business in California. Chad asked Kevin if he knew of a cool car in Maryland. 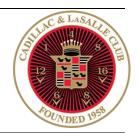

An All-GM Show was scheduled for Saturday, August 13 in Ashburn, VA. The weather forecast was clear skies and comfortable temperatures, so I decided to drive my 1941 Cadillac 67 Series Imperial Sedan to the show. It had not been out on the road since the middle of June.

On the Thursday before the show I went to the garage to do a pre-trip check. While removing the thin paint-shop-type plastic cover something started to move very quickly. It was a four-foot black snake laying unnoticed on the black car. It moved so quickly that it disappeared before I realized what was happening. I spent about an hour looking for it inside and under the car and even under the hood. There was no sign of it.

The next day I started the car and moved it around to the other end of the garage for cleanup, which took a couple of hours. On Saturday morning, I drove the car to the show which was about a 35-mile drive.

Upon arrival, I parked next to several friends, pulled a chair out of the trunk and joined in the conversation. About two hours had passed when someone noticed movement at the rocker right under the passenger door. Lo and behold it was the missing snake. He poked his head out for a few seconds then retreated under the car. About 10 minutes later, it came out and slithered past us off into the grassy field.



As best as I can tell the snake had taken up residence between the frame and body rocker. This would be near the muffler. It is amazing that 1) it made the long trip and 2) was able to withstand the heat.

GAS TANK TROUBLES BY CONSTANTIN JIGA

My 1959 Coupe Deville's fuel delivery system had been a headache for me for a while. When driving home from the Sport Cadillac / Potomac Region Car Show in the Spring, the car ran out of gas, although the gauge indicated the tank wasn't empty. Since then, I've dismantled the entire fuel system front to back and found numerous issues which prevented its proper operation.

I started with the gas tank. The previous owner replaced the factory one (22-gallon) with a newer, smaller aftermarket one (18-gallon). Then, he very poorly painted it some heinous brown color. When he replaced the gas tank, he also replaced the sending unit. Unbeknownst to him the new tank used different size thread fasteners. He tried using the same size screws and forced them into the threads. Luckily, he only managed to damage the threads on the fasteners and not the threads on the tank. I bought new screws and fixed that. Another issue was the orientation of the sealing gasket of the sending unit. He mangled that all up, so a new gasket was ordered.

The tank was like new on the inside, but with a good amount of rust particles that I discovered were from the filler neck. Upon further inspection, the filler neck was in terrible condition with heavy deposits





and a lot of corrosion. I cleaned it on the inside with a 2" stainless steel round brush and declared it good. In addition, a new rubber fuel hose was purchased to improve the seal between the tank and the filler neck. I allowed the tank to dry on the inside and vacuumed all the corrosion particles that made their way in there.





After removing the gas tank, I painted it royal blue with some paint I had around the garage. Once it was dry, I struggled mightily to install the tank back on the car and keep it properly aligned with the rubber insulators all the way around on the top and bottom straps. The little J fasteners were a particular nuisance. The vent on the back was also due a replacement rubber coupling, as the original one was still on and most likely the source of my fuel leak (when I used to add more than 10 gallons, gas would run out like an open spigot).





Moving up the fuel lines (my A/C car has two: a supply and a return) I discovered a fair amount of oxidation on them, so I replaced the rear rubber lines. Also, I replaced the rubber lines leading from the bottom of the car to the pump, took out the pump and sight glass fuel filter jar and cleaned them and polished all components to a shine. I remade all the joints with proper fuel Teflon tape. It was discovered that the fuel pump had a small leak and needed to be replaced. I would have liked to have an original AC pump, but the previous owner trashed the rebuildable original. The newer replacement pumps are not rebuildable because the membranes are joined with grommets in a press. Finally, new hoses and lines were ordered and installed under the carburetor to complete the job.

All in all, the car was on jack stands for two weeks. It took me about 20-30 hours to complete the work. Since my car has been lowered, it was a huge pain in the ^&* to reach underneath it while on stands. A car lift would have made my job a lot easier and perhaps safer.

My grandfather was a private driver, chauffeur for one of the wealthiest Englishmen who owned property in Belgium (where I was born) and France (Cannes, French Riviera). France is where I live today.

As a kid, I was motor mad. My parents didn't know what to do with me. They thought it was a temporary disease. My grandfather took me every Saturday morning to the big (drive through, gate to gate) L-shaped garage to clean the cars. His boss loved special-body cars like Alfas, Rovers and Talbot Lagos. It was around 1981 when I first saw a two-tone Bustleback Seville parked in the garage. It was for his Madame.

The gardeners didn't like it; they called it the ice cream back because of its two-tone color and strange trunk. My grandfather didn't like it because he was used to powerful cars, and this one didn't move that fast. I could have screamed "WOW" when I first saw it, but I kept my mouth shut. Maybe they would have thought I had bad taste. The car didn't last long as the salt ate away at it, while the 4.1 engine did the rest. I never forgot that car.

Since then, I have hardly ever seen those cars, and if I did, they have been in poor shape with no value. The Bustleback Seville I wanted was the twotone Elegante edition with a moon roof in new condition. In 2009, a 1982 version in New York showed up for sale on the internet. The previous owner was a member of the local police association. George & Toni Huse drove from Connecticut to check out the car. They bought it for me and took it to their home in Danbury. Upon arrival in Belgium, I saw the car was exactly what I wanted. It had 37,000 miles and looked new everywhere. We went through it and even removed and serviced the engine and

Unfortunately, this business didn't last long. I moved to France, while Tim stayed in the garage in Belgium. The stock was huge with racks and racks stacked over four meters high to the hangar roof filled with parts. We even had cut off quarter panels for the Bustleback Sevilles. Tim rented an old factory hall that was big!

We called each other regularly, but one day there was no answer and no reply to email. I had a big job to finish (renovation business in France), so it took me three months before I could get back to Belgium. When I returned, I saw the huge and empty parking lot (usually there were around 40 Caddys on the lot). A very bad feeling went over me that I recognized as death around the corner! I knocked on the neighbor's door. "Sir, we found him dead in his garage. He owed us rental money for the building." To collect their money, they called a scrapyard /old metal crusher company that paid the rent and "cleaned it up." AHH!


It's been several years now, but I still feel very sad about this. I miss my friend Tim every day (he was four weeks younger). Without my knowing, Tim's brother came over from Australia, organized the cremation of the body and took the ashes with him to spread across the Australian GM terrain. That is where he belongs, back home in GM heaven.

All that we collected such as computers, parts, Gucci Seville and other special edition items went into the trash bin, all gone! Because we had purchased most of those parts that existed throughout Europe, it created a faster death of the supply when they were all trashed.



Today, my Disco Seville has 50,000 miles, yes 50! It works perfectly in our modern times. The only thing not on board is Wi-Fi, but it has a CB radio! Thus, there's a wireless connection. Is a gas saver with a catalytic converter that can even be driven in Paris. Even better, in these "modern" days of pollution control madness and electric cars, people accept this little Caddy as it is a not too big of a gas guzzler. Of course, the old plastic pieces were cracked and had to be replaced (pictured left), along with other necessary regular maintenance. Instead of using GM's recommended tablets to protect the 4.1 engine, I use Wynn's (Belgium brand) liquid product.







What I can't find are people knowing this type of car and the 4.1 engine who are willing to help with info. Parts are also a problem. Pictured left is the exhaust part that needs to be replaced. Anybody know where I can find a replacement part?

As long as it's metal, it can be fixed or replaced, but what I'm afraid of is a dead computer. I remember Tim told me that Cadillac changed their computer supplier halfway in the build of 1982 Sevilles. The first series computer for the '82 model year doesn't work for the second half of the year's production and vice versa.

My experience with classic Cadillacs world-wide is that the Bustleback Sevilles, especially the Elegante editions with a moon roof in good shape, are very rare cars. I expect them to become very valuable in the near future as the new generation wants computers and the first full digital dashboards. The new generation doesn't want grandpa's car. They want 'new-age-cars,' and love disco, of course. Ha!

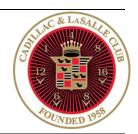

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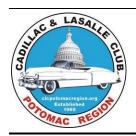
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
