Wishing everyone a happy, safe and prosperous new year!






LETTER TO THE EDITOR





Although they have owned this 1964 Eldorado for almost 30 years, Larry and Ilene Lesiger have added a mere 1,000 miles to the odometer. But this isn't for lack of interest; "I was driving a 1971 Eldorado when I bought this running car for \$500," he recalls. "I brought it to my mechanic's house, where it sat in his garage for 12 years. We sent it to Philadelphia to be painted, and got it back two years later. I then drove it for two years, but blew the engine on the way to Hershey. I bought another engine three years later, and brought it to be installed, getting the car back after another three years. The car has really never been driven!" he laughs. Larry's convertible features the enlarged-for-1964 429-cu.in. V-8 that makes 340hp with its 4-bbl. carburetor, as well as the new Turbo-HydraMatic transmission and Comfort Control automatic climate control system; this was one of many handsome 1964 Eldorados to be shown at this Eldorado Extravaganza.

My wife, Debbie, and I have had a rich array of experiences in our hobby: over forty AACA Fall Hershey shows, eight CLC Grand Nationals, four CLC National Driving Tours, a number of AACA tours, Monterey Historic Races at Laguna Seca, countless local regional shows and cruise-ins, a couple of Mecum auctions and six Miss America Parades in Atlantic City, NJ. But we've never participated in a "Concours d'Elegance" until now!

Via our 1941 Cadillac Convertible Coupe, we were fortunate to be invited to participate in the St. Michael's Concours d'Elegance ("Concours") on September 23-25, 2022, at the Talbot Country Club in Easton, MD. This was the 15th running of the Concours that has become one of the most prestigious classic car events in the Mid-Atlantic region.

This year 65 cars ranging from 1901 to 1972 from 17 states were displayed on the beautiful grounds of the water-side Talbot Country Club. Additionally, about 10 historic boats were also featured and docked by the show grounds of the club. Of special note was the Honorary Chair, Dave Prueitt, whose Prueitt Automotive Restoration business in Glen Rock, PA is very well known to Potomac Region and CLC members.

The host hotel for the event was the timeless Tidewater Inn, located in historic Easton, MD, where we stayed from Friday to Sunday. After working on the '41 all week to get things tidied-up, we drove the car the 65 miles over the Chesapeake Bay Bridge from Ellicott City, MD on Friday afternoon. When we arrived, I was surprised to find the hotel parking lot full, but nary an antique car could be seen. It turns out, we were the ONLY non-local owners who actually drove their car to the Concours. Everyone else had their cars trailered to a local marshalling site! Upon finally securing a space in the lot, several event participants, Thomas Hahn of NJ ('36 Cadillac Series 60 Coupe) and Bill Thompson of DE ('39 Packard Super 8 CCP), joked that "no old cars are allowed on the lot." Their friendly outreach was a clue of the collegiality and courtesy we experienced with all the entrants and staff of the Concours all weekend.

The weekend kicked off Friday night with an opening cocktail reception at the waterfront estate of Jeff & Darlene Spence in Royal Oak, MD, about 10 miles away. We followed a sparkling new Mercedes E-class onto the estate, where we were invited to park in front of the buildings with several other classic car entrants. Hors d'oeuvres, including fresh Chincoteague oysters, were served along with an open bar. Everyone had a great time looking over the vast estate which included several buildings with classic cars owned by the Spences. Here we met Joe & Gail Hiken, whose '67 Jaguar XKE roadster was part of the Concours. Gail and I have known each other since we were kids together in Sunday School at our church. What a small world! As darkness fell, we motored back to the Tidewater Inn with our 6V headlights lighting the way.

Saturday morning dawned with a Cars and Coffee event at the Talbot Country Club, followed by the St. Michaels driving tour. Here we met up with many of the other entrant cars and were mighty impressed. I was particularly attracted to a 1929 L-29 Cord convertible coupe equipped with Woodlite headlights. Dressed in black with bright orange accents, and chrome spoke wheels, this car was quite a sight! I was also drawn to a beautifully restored El Centro Green 1941 Cadillac Series 62 Convertible Sedan, owned by Crispin & John Menefee of Nashville, TN. We had great conversations with them during the whole weekend as our cars were positioned next to each other during the Concours showing.

With a Maryland State Police escort, the first leg of the tour took us to the <u>Cutts and Case Shipyard</u> in Oxford, MD. We enjoyed a leisurely 45-minute drive through the back roads of the Eastern Shore to this famous boatyard. If you are a fan of wooden boats, Cutts and Case is a must-see destination. There were numerous wooden speedboats and yachts in various stages of restoration. However, the artifact that really blew me away was a Packard V-12 marine engine out of a World War II PT boat on display. You would never confuse this beast with an automotive engine. Even more impressive is the knowledge that each PT boat was equipped with two of these behemoths!

Rolling in at the boatyard was a familiar sight – the 1931 Cadillac V-16 All-Weather Phaeton bodied by Fleetwood and formerly owned by the late Charles Gillet. We met the new owner, Leigh Brent of Baltimore. It turns out that Leigh's father was one of Charles Gillet's oldest friends, so Leigh was given the opportunity to bring the V-16 into his stable of classic Packards.

Our next stop was only several blocks away – the <u>Robert Morris Inn</u> on the waterfront of the Tred Avon River, an estuary of the Choptank River. There we had a fabulous crab cake lunch and were able to get pictures of our cars on the scenic riverfront. The Inn is a hotel and restaurant that dates to 1710 – a very worthwhile day or weekend trip destination.

We had the option of taking the nearby Oxford-Bellevue Ferry or drive back the 20+ miles to the hotel – we opted for the drive, as it was a beautiful day, and the back roads offered a leisurely driving experience in our 81-year-old ride.

Our Saturday night activity was a cocktail party and gourmet dinner back at the Talbot Country Club. Also for viewing was the premier showing of some boats and boat-themed cars along the waterfront. These special cars featured boat-shaped "skiff" bodies constructed in real wood: a '29 Duesenberg roadster, a '25 Hispano-Suiza Dual-Cowl phaeton and a '39 Rolls-Royce Wraith. These wooden masterpieces are all owned by The North Collection in Maryland and represent a fitting tribute to the maritime heritage of Maryland's Eastern Shore.





As we had to drive our '41 to the dinner, upon arrival we were asked if we wanted to park in our Concours spot overnight. With transportation arranged back to the hotel that night, we opted to go ahead and park the car in our Concours location. During the evening, we had many conversations that evening with new friends from all over the Eastern US who were entrants to the Concours – everyone couldn't have been more cordial. And it turned out our ride back to the hotel was with Greg & Robin Ornazian of Rochester Hills, MI, owners of that '29 Cord I had ogled earlier that morning

On Sunday we hopped a ride back to the Concours with Greg & Robin, only to find that it had rained overnight at the Club (but not the hotel). The car was soaking wet, so we spent the next hour wicking and drying it off. The Concours had a special class for Cadillac, so we were situated between a very rare '36 Cadillac Series 60 Coupe with side-mounts owned by Nicole & Thomas Hahn of Williamstown, NJ, and the aforementioned '41 Cadillac convertible sedan owned by the Menefees. Rounding out our four-car class was the ex-Gillet '31 V-16, so we had very stiff competition in the Cadillac class!








A fine line-up of Classic Cadillacs

There were several other notable Cadillacs in the Concours that were not included in the Cadillac class – a 1907 Model M Light Touring Car owned by Bill Lillie of CT, a 1912 Four-Passenger Torpedo Tourer brought by Jim Elliott of Yorktown, VA, and a 1957 Eldorado Biarritz convertible driven by Robert Thomas of Indianapolis, IN. The 1907 and 1912 cars were in the Antique class and the '57 was in the American Limited Production class.







The Line-up of Front Wheel Drive Classics.

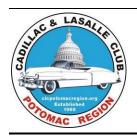



We tried not to let that worry us as we enjoyed viewing the cars and had a scrumptious lunch buffet. Daniel Jobe, our Region former sponsor at Capitol Cadillac and his wife Lisa stopped by our car for a visit, so it was great to catch-up with them.

With the weather looking more ominous, sadly we had to cancel a planned dinner meeting with Christopher Winter, Potomac Region Activities Director, at the Crab Claw in St. Michaels. He had recently moved to the Eastern Shore, so we were looking forward to visiting with him.

Alas, as the show-winning ribbons were being distributed and the class and special awards winners were being notified to prepare to "line-up" for the awards show and tell, we were not among those fortunate entrants. However, that didn't dampen our enjoyment and enthusiasm for the entire weekend and the "concours experience!"

The SS Cars Ltd company was later re-named Jaguar after WWII. This Saloon was finished in a stunning silver with a light blue interior, said to be coordinated to celebrate the 25th Silver Jubilee of King George V.

While our "survivor" car will never be competitive with the incredible nut and bolt restorations we encountered



at St. Michaels, we were truly thankful for the opportunity to participate and show our car. We had a lot of folks tell us they envied our ability to drive and enjoy our car!

A FURTIVE 1932 TOWN COUPE BY CHRIS CUMMINGS

Cadillac built not quite 300 V-16 cars for the 1932 model year. Overall, 1932 was one of the lowest-production years for Cadillac in its long history. That was the year when The Great Depression really began to bite, and people in all economic strata faced the new reality of greatly reduced spending power. No longer could one pass it off as a temporary adjustment of the stock market – by 1932 it was clear that things would be rough for some time to come. Those who still had means became much more circumspect about showing that fact to others.

Notwithstanding the headwinds, though, the 1932 cars that Cadillac introduced (V-16, V-12 and V-8) were dramatically different from the 1930 and 1931 models. Streamlining was taking hold in a big way, and the first thing that the viewer noticed was that sharp corners and straight lines were nearly eliminated in favor of curves and wind-cheating shapes. The attached sunshade was gone from the windshield. The lights were rounded like teardrops. Fenders blended into running boards, and door hinges were tucked inside, out of sight. GM's chief stylist Harley Earl would maintain for the rest of his life that the 1932 Cadillacs were his favorite design.

Technological advances were highlighted – controlled freewheeling, ride control (driveradjustable shock absorbers) and headlights that could be adjusted five different ways from the driver's seat were new conveniences. A mechanical fuel pump represented a significant improvement over the vacuum tanks previously used, and Detroit Lubricator carburetors replaced the venerable but more primitive "Cadillac Johnson" models. Drop-center wheel rims vastly simplified the process of changing tires. In all, the 1932 Cadillacs were a big step forward for the company.



One of the most practical body styles in the 1932 Cadillac portfolio was the town coupe. This was a five-passenger car with two doors. The front passenger seat folded forward to permit the rear seat passengers to board. Behind the passenger compartment was a built-in

trunk, and behind that was a folding rack on which an additional accessory trunk could be mounted. The windows, windshield and backlight (what the industry now calls the daylight opening or "DLO") were expansive, giving the occupants a feeling of openness and freedom.

Twenty-four 1932 V-16 town coupes were built by Fleetwood in Style Number 32-16-222 (also designated 5181). One more was built by Fisher Body as Job Number 32-16-272. One of those town coupes (whether Fisher or Fleetwood is not certain) had engine number 1400233. We know nothing about its first 57 years. It was sold as Lot Number 696 at the Barrett-Jackson Classic Car Auction at Scottsdale, Arizona on New Year's Day, 1989, and its exterior color was described as "MAROON/GREY/WHITE." The Barrett-Jackson website gives no more information than that. After the auction, the car appears to have migrated to Switzerland and to have remained there in quiet storage for something over 30 years.





In late Summer of 2022, the town coupe with engine number 1400233 emerged briefly on the website of an auction company in Toffen, Switzerland (Oldtimer Galerie Toffen). It was to be sold at an October 15 auction, and several photographs were posted on the website. The write-up in the auction catalog had little to say about the car's history beyond its removal to Switzerland and longterm dry storage. The accompanying photographs showed a car with maroon moldings and wheels, grey fenders and spare tire covers, and white body, all consistent with the Barrett-Jackson description from 1989. When November 2022 rolled around, the Oldtimer Galerie removed the car's description and photos from its website (along with an advertisement on the Hemmings Motor News website), but the auction catalog remained accessible.

Meanwhile, the December 2022 print edition of *Hemmings Motor News* carried a picture ad for the 1932 town coupe, without an asking price, but giving a phone number and Oldtimer Galerie's email address.

What we know is that the car has survived to the present, has been well taken care of, and probably continues to reside in Europe.

Maybe we'll learn more about it in the future.



NEW ARRIVAL 1928 LaSalle Model 303 Cabriolet - CLC Senior Car #1 awarded in 1985 at Grand National in Valley Forge, PA - 27,480 original miles, mostly accumulated during The Great Depression when the running-gear was employed to run a sawmill for earning money by cutting cord-wood - As a result, brake linkages, gear shift mechanism, clutch and transmission show no wear - Only two owners in its 90+ year history, with restoration completed by current owners - Engine was rebuilt with black-iron compression rings and new valves and springs - Babbitt rod and main bearings were measured to within specifications - Carburetor was rebuilt with a new float and leather accelerator pump piston - Rebuilt water pump and vacuum tank rebuilt with new toggle valves, springs and gaskets - Rebuilt distributor with new points and condenser, the advance counter-weight was installed - Oil filter canister has Purolator filter hidden inside and new Robertshaw bellows, thermostat installed in the radiator - No more than 1,600 miles have accumulated in the past 35 years since its restoration, including for Harrah's sponsored run from Philadelphia to Atlantic City and back, with the LaSalle performing flawlessly Seats are finished in burnt orange Bridge of Weir leather and top is Haartz cloth - All castings (side-mirror stanchions, parking light brackets, windshield shade brackets, bumper guards, sector gear, carburetor and mount, headlight stanchions and oval head screws and dashboard and headlight control handles were machined by owner) are cast of red-bronze and all chrome plating was done by Harry Martin Inc. of Philadelphia - Finish on the panel below the back window is crazed, including the rear sides (back of fender wells) and the back of the panel below the rumble-seat door - According to DuPont Paint Systems, the painter used an inferior thinner instead of the more costly and compatible DuPont 3602S product which we had provided – Painter confessed that rather than opening the five-gallon 3602S that we had provided for him to finish the painting, he decided to use leftover thinner (Brand-X) from a production job - Those areas need to be repainted and the price has been reduced accordingly - 35 years since its restoration and the LaSalle continues to be heralded as 'the favorite car' at many events – In addition to the CLC Senior Award, it has won an AACA National First Award, CCCA National 2nd Place and numerous first place awards in the Mid-Atlantic states - Recognized in the Radnor Hunt Concours d' Elegance Invitational and featured in the CCCA's book titled "Classic Car--The Ultimate Book About the World's Grandest Automobiles," pages 298 and 299, edited by Beverly Rae Kimes - See pictures - \$64,700 obo - Payment must be made in CASH, Cashier's Check or Bank Transfer - Buyer MUST make all transport arrangements - Sellers will meet the transporters for pickup, but cannot physically assist with the move - For more information, contact Wes Waters at 610-449-0781 or send email - Car is located in Havertown, PA



1940 Cadillac Fleetwood Series 75 Seven-Passenger Sedan – Only 1940 model to have suicide doors – Dark blue – Body has no rust – Right rear fender has a long scratch and would need to be repaired and refinished – Appears to be pretty much all original and in very good condition although it may have been repainted many years ago – Front seat is leather and the rear seat and two jump seats are broadcloth – Interior door panels are in need of some repair as well as the front seat, but overall looks quite good – V-8 engine has recently been completely rebuilt – Starts easily and runs well with no overheating – Some front end parts and exhaust have been replaced – New Firestone whitewall tires w/tubes – Bumpers, hubcaps and all other chrome are in excellent condition – Rubber on the running boards is worn and should be replaced – Garage kept – Mileage unknown – Same owner since 2016 – Clear Maryland title – Full car cover – See pictures – \$32,000 – For more info, contact Jerry Smith at 301-706-5418 – Car is located in Urbana, MD


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
