IN MEMORIAM: MAURICE "GENE" SAUTER BY THE SAUTER FAMILY AND VINCE TALIANO PHOTOS BY JACK MCCLOW AND THE SAUTER FAMILY



Former CLC Potomac Region member Maurice "Gene" Sauter of Ellicott City, MD passed away on March 14, 2024, at age 84. Born in Baltimore, his journey began early in life with an innate curiosity and talent for all things mechanical. An honored Air Force veteran, this interest led him to pursue a career in automobile mechanics, a field where he not only excelled but also found great joy. Gene began working for Oldsmobile in Baltimore. His expertise and dedication to his craft culminated in his esteemed position as Vice President of 40 West Motors, owned by the late Potomac Region member Charles Gillet, Jr.

Gene was a cherished husband, father, grandfather, great-grandfather, brother, uncle and friend, whose passion for mechanical wizardry touched everyone he knew. The family knew well of Gene's strong work ethic. While at 40 West Motors, he only took one sick day in 38 years. The story of Gene walking to work in blizzard conditions with snow two-feet deep to guard against vandals at the dealership will continue to be told. Gene's service in the Air Force was a significant chapter in his life, shaping his character and reinforcing his commitment to excellence and service.

A man of many interests, Gene was particularly known for his love of classic cars. His collection was not merely a hobby but a reflection of his appreciation for design, history and the thrill of restoration. English cars and hot rods were among his favorites, and he delighted in maintaining and showcasing these automotive treasures. Gene's hands were rarely still, as he could often be found tinkering in his garage, bringing life back to vehicles that others had long forgotten.

Gene and his wife Betty were close friends with the late Charles Gillet, Jr. Gene was Charles' Service Manager at 40 West Motors at the time Charles purchased his first classic automobile in

1975, a "barn find" 1954 Bentley. From that point forward, they enjoyed the hobby together.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

March 1, 2024



Between 1960 and 1979, I worked at the original Capitol Cadillac on 22nd Street NW, Washington, DC, as everything from a car jockey, lot boy, apprentice mechanic, mechanic (everything but front end), shop foreman, shop superintendent and assistant service manager. At times, the 1953 Cadillac LeMans was stored there. I believe that I drove it around once or twice on the lot while relocating it. The car was yellow back then. Below is what I was told by the elders who worked there.

The car was originally a concept car that was never intended to be driven. Capitol Cadillac owner Floyd Akers took a liking to it, and having much sway in Detroit, was able to obtain it. The engine, transmission and running gear were installed along with other equipment to make it drivable. The one thing I was told in person was that it also had no gauges. They had to be fabricated from scratch. The man who told me this was one of the fabricators, Howard Zinn (my ex-father-in-law). He said he and Johnny Coffin, another longtime employee of the shop, did the delicate work.

As an employee there, I also had the occasion to drive other exotic cars around (usually short moves) like the two 1956 Cadillac Secret Service convertibles everyone knows from the Kennedy assassination footage, as well as the infamous 1961 Lincoln Continental Presidential Limousine after it was armored following the tragic event (Charter Member Ellwood Brown recalls seeing the car there as well).

I also did much work on the J. Edgar Hoover FBI Cadillac limousines that were only armored from the glass down. I still have the wiring diagram from

the 1968 model that was provided to me in case there were problems in the rear part of the car.

After 1979, I worked at Moore Cadillac in Virginia, then back to Capitol and now Sport Cadillac in Silver Spring, MD. Hope to see everyone at the Spring Car Show at Sport on Sunday, May 5.



Vehicles will be peer judged by the individual owners of the registered cars, including their own. Awards will be given to winning vehicles in each class. Trailer parking is available.
- Food and Drink: A food vendor will be on-site. All participants and guests are responsible for their own food and beverages.
- **<u>Chairs</u>** All participants and guests are responsible for bringing their own chairs.

CHARTER MEMBER UPDATES BY VINCE TALIANO

As part of the CLC Potomac Region's 55th Anniversary, I tried to connect with and/or locate all of the Charter Members who appeared in the photographs below from the first region meeting in January 1969 at Ron & Sherie Van Gelderen's house in McLean, VA. Not pictured below is Charter Member Bill Thomas who took the pictures (read more about Bill on the next page).

I was successful in many cases with Charter Members who no longer live in the area: Ellwood Brown - FL, George Teebay -CA and Fred Westenberger -FL. In the case of "Ralph Perkens," as spelled in **The Self-Starter** photo caption, I had difficulty because a Google search of the name did not result in anything, plus he is only listed once in the early Potomac Region material, as "Ralph Pekins." So, for the

anniversary material, we settled with "Perkins" because there are quite a few Ralph Perkins in the world, including a 79-year-old in Northern Virginia who I called and was politely told wasn't the Ralph I was trying to locate.

After the March newsletter was published with the attendees pictured, Charter Member Ellwood Brown contacted Dan Ruby and said that "Ralph's name was misspelled." He remembered it as "Peckins" and that last he heard Ralph was in Tennessee. A quick Google search found an obituary for a "Ralph Aubrey Peckins" from Clarkesville, GA who died in 2019 at the age of 85. It said that he was a retired licensed chauffeur who he had a great love for antique automobiles and in his spare time enjoyed restoring them (view <u>Ralph's obituary</u>). He would have been 34 years old in January 1969, which is a reasonable age considering how he looked in the photograph. Charter Member Bill Thomas also reached out saying that Ralph's name was misspelled and that he had passed away in Clarkesville, GA. Bill remembered that Ralph had a beautiful 1941 Cadillac Series 75 Formal Limousine with blind quarter panels (no windows behind the rear doors) and performed the concours quality restoration work on his Cadillac himself. Ellwood recalled that there was a vanity license plate with his initials RAP on Ralph's '41 Limo that caused him some trouble from time to time. People thought the car belonged to H. Rap Brown, an American human rights activist and black separatist. Ralph also wore a chauffeur's cap when he drove the car.

Ellwood also informed us that Charter Member Fred Westenberger of Winter Springs, FL passed away in 2021 at the age of 81 (view <u>Fred's obituary</u>). Fred drove a blue '57 Eldorado Biarritz back in the day and was in charge of the machinery at A&R Tool Rental. He was a close friend of Charter Member Glen Cole (pictured above) and a great mechanic. Rest in peace to all the Charter Members who have passed away!





MEMORIES OF '69 BY BILL THOMAS

I remember well the taking of pictures at the CLC Potomac Region's first meeting at Ron and Sherie Van Gelderen's home in January 1969, as I took some of them and therefore, was not in the ones published [on the previous page]. It was great that so many people attended, but it meant the pictures needed to be taken in two shots because not all attendees could be accommodated in one picture. The pictures were taken between Ron and Sherie's living and dining room because it was the only area indoors that could accommodate a picture of up to half the attendees. Except for two children who were there, including Ron & Sherie's son, I was the youngest attendee at just eighteen years old!

Living not far from Ron at the time, I would see him driving his Cadillacs. That's how we met, as I was driving a 1956 Series 62 Sedan in 1968. My car was present at the first Potomac Region Car Show at Capitol Cadillac in Greenbelt, MD in 1992 (pictured below), along with my parents, Bill & Virginia Thomas, pictured next to me in the center, and the late Juan Aranda. Juan was a great fellow and a true Cadillac enthusiast, who was also at the first meeting in 1969. We would park cars together at the City of Rockville shows.

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THE EARLY DAYS BY ELLWOOD BROWN

My Cadillac story starts in the late 1950s. When I was 13 years old, I saw a black 1960 Eldorado Brougham imported from Italy and on display at Capitol Cadillac in Washington, DC in April 1959 (pictured below) and then the silver Cadillac Cyclone in July that year. I don't think the Cyclone had an engine in it yet, but one of my pictures below shows the extra gauges, so maybe it was drivable at that point. Obviously, they didn't want a 13-year-old poking around under the hood.



I saw the Kennedy Assassination Lincoln when it returned from Dallas and was stored in back of Capitol Cadillac [as mentioned in Jim Churchill's Letter to the Editor on page 4]. I wish, looking back, my camera was with me that day as the car was untouched from the incident. The dealership also took care of the Secret Service cars and kept them in a private garage outside. If you were nice to the guard, he would let you in to look around.

When the White House had late '30s V-16 parade cars, they would overheat so badly in parades that they finally installed V-8 engines in them. V-16 engines were lying around behind Capitol Cadillac, but after WWII you could barely give them away. Some were sold to buyers in Texas to run oil rigs, but nobody knows what happened to the rest of them.

By the time I attended the Region's first meeting in 1969 at Ron Van Gelderen's house, I already knew a lot about Cadillac's history. I have great memories of many early members like Fred Westenberger, Ralph Peckins, George Teebay, Martha Jane Kennedy, C.P. "Johnny" Johnson, Glen Cole, Steven and Richard Sisson, Bill Thomas, Bryce Frey, Juan Aranda, Charlie Lightbown, Henry Ruby, etc.





MY RECOLLECTIONS BY GEORGE TEEBAY

Thanks to Vince Taliano and Ellwood Brown for reaching out to me! I was sorry to hear of the passing of Ralph Peckins and Fred Westenberger, but I am happy they lived long and productive lives.

I'm now 81 years old and living in San Leandro, CA in the San Francisco Bay Area. My 1939 Cadillac Series 75 Seven-Passenger Sedan, present at the region's founding meeting in 1969 (pictured upper far right), now lives two blocks away, owned by a close friend who has driven it 20,000 miles in the last 14 years or so. I bought that car in the Bay Area



in May 1968 upon my return from Vietnam, rebuilt the carburetor, and drove it the "Long Way" to my next Army assignment in Washington, DC, via the Grand Canyon, New Orleans, Fort Benning, Atlanta, Knoxville and up the Shenandoah Valley to suburban DC. I borrowed a 1968 CLC Directory from renowned Bay Area Cadillac collector (Bob) Schultz (even his wife calls him just "Schultz"), who has become a lifetime friend and who turned 88 recently. I wanted it in case I needed to find a part such as a water pump or generator from a member in another state on my cross-country run. I still have that directory and will return it to Schultz with all due ceremony on his 90th birthday! Hope that intention will keep both of us alive until then!

After arriving in the DC area, I used the borrowed directory to call Leonard Leimbach, owner of three 1939 75s, two of which were sedans and one a convertible coupe (total production = 27). I wanted the convertible coupe in the worst way, but it didn't fly with my then-wife. Mrs. Leimbach informed me that her husband had recently died and put me onto Glen Cole who became a close friend and Cadillac mentor. I was able to stay in touch with Glen until a year or so before he passed (RIP, Glen!). And that's how I came to be at the Potomac Region's founding meeting in January 1969, and meet many of the members. I knew Henry Ruby and Juan Aranda slightly through region activities and am sorry they are no longer with us. The best way to honor these members who were mentors to us is to be mentors to others – pay it forward!

I left active duty in September 1971 and returned to the Bay Area, flat towing the 1939 behind a 1964 Series 60 sedan purchased from a Potomac Region member. I was young and dumb to do that but got home without incident. I was active in CLC's Northern California Region for many years. Perhaps 15-20 years ago, the CLC had its Board Meeting in the Bay Area, and I joined the group afterwards for cocktails and vehicle admiration at Schultz's shop. CADILLAC COLLECTION: BEFORE THE FORD MOTOR COMPANY BY BOB BAER

While in Ft Myers, FL recently, we visited the museum at the <u>Edison</u> and Ford Winter <u>Estates</u>. On display was a 1906-08 Cadillac / Columbia Motor Car. Here is the description that was on the placard next to the car.

"In 1901, Henry Ford became one of the principal founders of the Henry Ford Company. His role was to design, create and manufacture a commercial car, but he left after just three months due to differences of opinion over the types of vehicles the company would produce. Afterward, the business reorganized as the Cadillac Automobile Company and began producing high-end vehicles. Cadillac was purchased by the General Motors Corporation in 1909 and



continues to serve as their luxury brand.

This unique vehicle features a 1908 chassis and four-cylinder engine produced by the Cadillac Motor Car Company. However, it has been modified to accommodate a 1906 Columbia electric car cab.

Did you know? Edison saw electric vehicles as the transportation of the future, and even experimented with the use of a nickel-iron alkaline storage battery as a clean source of power for automobiles."


