DIRECTOR'S REMARKS: Dan Ruby thanked everyone for attending. If you plan to attend the Car Show and Automobilia Auction on Sunday, May 5 and haven't pre-registered yet, please do so. The deadline for the discounted fee of \$20 is Saturday, April 27. To date, less than 20 cars have been pre-registered. In addition, volunteers are still needed to help with day of show activities ranging from registering and parking cars to assisting with other duties as needed. SECRETARY'S REMARKS: The minutes from the previous meeting were not reviewed since they were published and distributed to all members in the April 2024 newsletter.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Bill Hilliard reported on the financials since the last meeting. Total revenue was \$654.82 and total expense of \$264.49 for the period, resulting in a net gain of \$390.33. Most of the revenue was from car show registrations and a donation.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT: Franklin Gage announced that we currently have 160 dues-paying family memberships for 2024. Region information has been shared with two relatively new CLC members in the area, who have expressed interest.

ACTIVITIES REPORT: The following activities were discussed:

Thanks to Daniel for his generous donation to the Potomac Region of some of the proceeds, and additional items he is donating to the CLC Museum & Research Center for the upcoming auction at the Grand National in Gettysburg, PA.



- <u>Rain Date</u>: If inclement weather causes a postponement or cancellation, an email will be sent to all pre-registered attendees (email address required on registration form) and Potomac Region members. In addition, an announcement will be posted on the club's website.
- <u>Safety</u>: If a vehicle has fluid drips or leaks, the owner must bring absorbent material or drip pans to avoid slippery conditions and to protect the show field parking lot. The Potomac Region reserves the right to prevent any cars with excessive fluid leaks from entering the show field. It is recommended that a working fire extinguisher be in every vehicle.
- Judging / Parking Rules: The Potomac Region reserves the right 1) to determine each vehicle's judging class and 2) placement in the show field. Vehicles will be peer judged by the individual owners of the registered cars, including their own. Awards will be given to winning vehicles in each class. Trailer parking is available.
- Food and Drink: A food vendor will be on-site. All participants and guests are responsible for their own food and beverages.
- **<u>Chairs</u>** All participants and guests are responsible for bringing their own chairs.

TIRED OF I-95 TRAFFIC AROUND THE RICHMOND / NORTHERN VA CORRIDOR? DO A PITSTOP AND VISIT THESE GEMS ALONG THE ROUTE! BY MORGAN YEH

We saw some gems along the route on a recent family road trip! Our first stop was the <u>Keystone Truck & Tractor</u> <u>Museum</u>, just south of Richmond, VA right off of I-95. Do not let the name deceive you because the trucks and tractors are only the beginning of the collection. On display among a large selection of cars at the museum is a beautiful 1967 Cadillac DeVille Convertible, plus vintage Harley-Davidson motorcycles (pictured bottom right).

Other vehicles include a 1960 Studebaker Hawk Coupe and a selection of hot rods in gleaming colors. Actually, there are Studebaker trucks in the museum too, as they were a major truck / "motorized wagon" manufacturer in the early 20th century. And of course, the trucks, tractor trailers and farm tractors are eye-candy for those interested in massive workhorse machinery.

When I was in seventh grade, my dream job was to be a truck driver (today I have a desk job). During the lockdown, I nearly got my Commercial Driver's License (CDL) because I heard the roads were literally wide open and free of traffic. It sounded like a ton of fun, but we just had our third child and my wife, Chia-Hua, hinted that "it was not the best idea" for the family, which made sense. The closest I get now is a major family road trip!









Next up on our trip is a place you will want to call up before visiting, the Classic Car Center of Fredericksburg, VA. They restore and sell unique automobiles, plus restored lawn care equipment (proceeds support Virginia's Families of the Wounded). In the back of the warehouse area, they store a lot of personal vehicles for people who want to winterize their cars in an ideal

For my son's birthday in 2023 he asked me to bring him to a place where there were lots of unique cars that one would not normally see on the road. I did some research and discovered this place, also off of I-95, but between Richmond and Northern Virginia.

location away from the elements.

I called to request a visit. They welcomed us to stop by, and allowed us to tour the rear warehouse to check out people's personal vehicles, with the understanding that we would not touch the cars, which we promised to abide by. They also had a few featured showroom vehicles for sale. From April through October, they host a Cars and Coffee with yummy goodies on the last Saturday of the month from 8:00-10:00 am. There is no admission fee to attend. One time, we took our 1992 Cadillac Brougham d'Elegance (pictured above) to visit, and people were flagging us down when we were leaving to get a closer look at the car. Of course, we stayed a bit longer that time!

The Wheel Deal

Randy Denchfield doesn't like to say how many antique cars he owns. But you can get an idea from this: Some are stored in a private, 14-car garage under a local Giant supermarket; one is at a friend's house in Bethesda; another three are at his home in Chevy Chase.

"I have a disease," Denchfield admits. "I'm a car nut."

Denchfield delivered newspapers when he was growing up in the D.C. area, and he always noticed the cars in neighbors' driveways. He often could remember a car model more easily than a neighbor's name. Today at 66, he owns the commercial roofing company he started 40 years ago. But antique cars remain his passion.

Denchfield refers to automobiles as "rolling art." Many of the cars he owns which he began collecting seriously at about age 40—date to the 1930s, when art deco was big. One of his favorites is an orange 1935 LaSalle with a rumble seat and suicide doors, which open from left to right. Only nine 1935 LaSalle convertible coupes are known to exist, according to Denchfield, and he owns two of them (the second features the classic pairing of maroon and black).

Many people see car collecting as an expensive hobby, but Denchfield says you can find a 1970s-circa running convertible for as little as \$4,000. Collectors, however, can spend thousands more renovating one to factory condition. Denchfield goes to a dozen car shows a year, in addition to local events. Two of his cars have won Grand National Awards from the Antique Automobile Club of America, and another four have won senior awards from the Cadillac Club. Car collectors are all the same, Denchfield says: "They love to show them, they love to talk about them."

Denchfield's wife, **Susan**, enjoys the car collection nearly as much as he does. Denchfield says she often takes one of the cars out to drive around on nice days.

In 1934 and 1935, many cars came with suicide doors, which are hinged at the rear. Denchfield says one theory behind the name was that the door would fly off the hinges if it was opened while the car was moving. This is the second of the two La Salle convertible coupes that Denchfield owns. He loves the color scheme, which is typical of a 1930s car.

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

THE DUKE OF MARLBORO BY GABE SIMERSON



My family tells me my fascination with things that go began in infancy, when I would hang over the edge of the stroller to watch the wheels. It was said that summer rides in my dad's red NA Mazda Miata were a surefire way to get me to quiet down and fall asleep for the night. Later on, I was mesmerized by the barely-together 1964 Chrysler Imperial a neighbor daily drove to his job at the bar, with an exhaust leak so major it rattled the window screens. Car shows were my favorite summer activity—smelling the interiors, admiring the lines, hearing the startups, etc. But in our average suburban life, the closest I got to tinkering myself was helping my dad with oil changes on the Miata. He told stories of the days of carburetors, but they were only stories. By last year, when I turned 25, I realized this was the cheapest my life will ever be—no health issues, no kids and no

mortgage. So, I decided it was time to just do it and buy a classic car for myself. I could watch as many YouTube videos as I wanted, but I would never learn until I finally tried.

Since my taste varies from British roadsters and pre-fin Americana to malaise-era barges and beyond, I wanted to start with something "new" enough that fundamental parts wouldn't all need to be fabricated or bought at auction, domestic and mainstream enough that I didn't need an über-specialist mechanic, and a non-ragtop, probably non-European specimen (as for the time being it needs to live outside – I hear your cringes!). That meant no MGB yet, and nothing pre-'60s. The '77-92 Caddies seemed ideal (as my last criterion was relative parkability). After

weeks of research and scrolling the ever-trustworthv medium known as Facebook Marketplace, I decided either a late 350-powered rig or a '77-79 425 was the way to go. Luckily, I found my best bet: a triple-white '77 Coupe de Ville with red trim for sale at a fair price in Upper Marlboro, MD. I



bought the car and dubbed it "Duke-the Duke of Marlboro."





After cruising over the Potomac River to my home in Alexandria, VA, Duke was filled up with his ceremonial first tank, and parked overnight. The first day of the rest of my life began the next morning with an urgent knock from a neighbor who reported the gas tank was leaking in the parking lot and had been all night! From that moment on, I learned something the hard way about the car nearly every day. Except for when it involved unavoidable expense or social unrest, I enjoyed it, at least after the fact.

Duke has an older repaint that's deceptively pretty from about 25 feet away. Other than aftermarket (but correctly sized) wheels and inauthentic wire wheel covers, most else is original, for better or worse. Despite an alleged 72,000 miles, it feels tired enough to convince me some routine maintenance was neglected. The biggest threat to its health is a knocking rear end that still keeps me up at night. But these things have made for a valuable crash course on the fundamentals.

In my first five months as a classic car owner, I've learned:

- No issue is ever isolated
- Cars are never "finished"
- Nothing is free, and shortcuts never work in the long term
- Second opinions are good; third opinions are better
- Learn to do as much as you can yourself, with the guidance of wise friends
- Best resources are experienced peers (I never felt so relieved as at my first CLC Potomac Region meeting in February 2024 when every issue I named was met with an "oh, I've dealt with that" from a seasoned veteran)

As I wasn't raised living and breathing oil, sweat and gears, I'm grateful to have found CLC members to shepherd me through this wonderful hobby.


