IN MEMORIAM: ROBERT "BOB" LESLIE ARNOLD, JR. BY THE ARNOLD FAMILY



Former CLC Potomac Region member Bob Arnold of Stafford, VA, passed away on May 25, 2025, at the age of 86. He was born on June 24, 1938, in Baltimore, MD, the son of the late Robert L. Arnold, Sr., and Almeda Arnold, and was the beloved husband of the late Carolyn Arnold.

Bob graduated from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1960 with a degree in Mechanical Engineering. He went on to found the business Wilbar and Arnold, and his dealership became the first in the United States to carry the English JCB backhoe. A passionate car enthusiast, Bob owned many Corvettes and was the co-owner of Cooper Corvettes in Triangle, VA. As an active member of the local Corvette club, he enjoyed both racing and touring.



He had a lifelong love of cars, tractors, and large construction equipment, and took great pride and joy in driving his bright red, award-winning 1959 Cadillac Series 62 convertible. In 2019, he attended the CLC Potomac Region's Spring Car Show at Capitol Cadillac in Greenbelt, MD, where his convertible won two awards: First Place in Class and Best Modified (pictured left with his car, awards and family).

Bob cherished the many lifelong friendships he built through his business ventures and the car club community. He is survived by his first wife, Sarah Bouscaren, and their three children, two step-daughters, one sister, seven grandchildren and one greatgrandchild.

DIRECTOR'S REMARKS: Chuck Piel welcomed everyone to the meeting. On behalf of the Region, he congratulated Potomac Region officers Larry Good and Vince Taliano for winning the CLC's Maurice Hendry and Website Excellence awards, respectively, at the Grand National in Murfreesboro, TN. The Hendry Award recognized Larry for his excellent journalistic contributions in furtherance of the purposes of the Club, while the Website Excellence Award acknowledged Vince for his outstanding efforts as the Region's Webmaster. It should also be mentioned that while the Potomac Region did not win the Norm Uhlir Regional Activity award, we did win an honorable mention as a "Region of Merit" which carries a logo we can publish on our website.

SECRETARY'S REMARKS: The minutes from the previous meeting held in April were not reviewed since they were published and distributed to all members in the May newsletter.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Bill Hilliard reported the financials from the last meeting. The Region had total revenue of \$2,869.37 and total expenses of \$1,289.79, resulting in a net income of \$1,579.58. Most of the revenue and expenses were related to the car show and automobilia auction held at Sport Cadillac in May, including a donation for awards by the dealership.

The CLC Grand National took place from Monday-Saturday, June 2-7 at the Embassy Suites by Hilton located in Murfreesboro, TN. The hotel offered two-room suites along with daily complimentary made-to-order full breakfasts and cocktails and light snacks in the evening. CLC Meets and Tours Committee members arrived two days before the event to set up the registration, hospitality suite and show field, while attendees started arriving on Sunday, June 1.



Daylight broke on Monday, June 2, with a planned, 100-mile, self-directed driving tour. Dave Rubin (pictured left), VP for National Activities, conducted a briefing. He had previously mapped out the itinerary and visited the two facilities that participants would visit. The first stop was the Beechcraft Heritage Museum in Tullahoma, TN, where participants toured a 78,000 square foot facility with 38 Beechcraft planes and various aviation artifacts. Next stop was the Jack Daniels Distillery in Lynchburg, TN, that afforded members the opportunity to sample some

of the finest liquid refreshments, as well as pick up a few pints from the company store to take home. The 100-plus participants were provided a list of restaurants along the route, allowing them to branch out and explore various places on the way back to the hotel.





The next day, Tuesday, June 3, was the first of several days of bus tours. Club members gathered in the lobby of the hotel conference center to board 55-passenger buses on their way to several private collections in the immediate Nashville, TN, area. The first stop was the Willis Johnson Collection. After enjoying the hospitality of the Johnsons, the tour continued to the



collection of Reba & Roger McCalmon. Participants not only experienced the southern hospitality of the collection owners but got to see a wide variety of over 500 preserved cars from multiple eras. After a morning and early afternoon of enjoying the two fine collections, members had the opportunity to participate in a gathering of the Cadillac Queens, the women of the Cadillac & LaSalle Club). Then, the Welcome Reception in the main ballroom of the hotel kicked off the 2025 CLC Grand National with a silent auction (pictured left) and musical entertainment provided by the Valley Forge Region's own resident crooner, Joe Caristo.

Wednesday, June 4, again began with scheduled bus tours. Two buses took additional members to visit the two car collections visited the day before. Meanwhile, one busload of members visited the Country Music Hall of Fame, where members had adequate time to see music venues and various westernthemed shops on Broadway Street in downtown Nashville. That tour ended at the Lane Motor Museum, a facility with a variety of 150 antique cars. Once members returned to the hotel, they could participate in a Technical Advisors Meet & Greet before grabbing dinner at one of the many fine restaurants in the immediate area. Afterwards, there was an exciting game of BINGO with the opportunity to win cash prizes.

Thursday, June 5, started with two more bus tours, one repeating the trip to downtown Nashville and a second one to the Green Distillery in Rutherford County, TN, which was founded by a freed slave after The War Between the States. A nice onsite restaurant called The Barrel House served lunch for members, while those of the proper age participated in a tasting of the products of the Green Distillery. In the afternoon, new Chief Judge Fred Butalla conducted two Judging Seminars for the members who volunteered to judge the approximately 130 Cadillacs and LaSalles that graced the Show Field. Thursday ended with a Town Hall, providing members an opportunity to discuss the current state of the Club and goals for the future, with CLC leadership.

PART I: THREE SHIPS IN A BOTTLE

What a display! Arriving at the 2025 Grand National last month, this is what people saw in the hotel corridor: Tom & Lynn Keegan's 1939 V-16; a 1929, 2¹/₂ ton, 7-passenger survivor; and a 1976 Brougham sandwiched in between them (pictured right).

I sent this picture to my brother, and right off he responded, "How did they get the cars in there?" Good question. All I could think of was putting ships in a bottle. With Cadillacs, you'd have to compress two of the dimensions, then pull the drawstrings after the cars were in place. Of course, this procedure would only aggravate the oil drips on the nice carpet.

Since this deranged theory could impact my reputation, I decided to get up early on Sunday morning and watch how they get these craft back out of the bottle. The cars are heavy, and the carpet is soft. It took five or six guys to push one. Two other men worked the plastic runners to catch oil. This went on for the first long corridor, the 90° turn, and the second long corridor until they ran out of rug.

TOURING THE NICKETT COLLECTION BY MORGAN YEH

Sunday, April 27 was windy, for sure, just like my visit to the Nickett Collection in Doylestown, PA, last year! Even during the drive to and from Doylestown, PA, we felt the crosswinds pummeling the 1992 Cadillac Brougham d'Elegance. Despite the rocking, the car tracked straight. I had made a trip the day before in my Toyota 4Runner, a day trip from home to NYC and back, and it was all-hands-on-deck, trying to straighten out the steering during all that heavy wind. The wind will let you know whether you are in a tall car versus a low car.

Despite the wind, the drive was wonderful and scenic, as we opted to take the backroads for most of the trip. Dan Mullane and Scott Patton met up at my place in Loudoun County at 7:00 am that Sunday morning, and we threaded up towards our destination, going on Route 15, Route 30, threading through York, PA, then Route 222, and finally hopping on I-76 for the last stretch. On the way, I pointed out the Lovettsville, VA, location to the guys to show them where Chia-Hua and I got married in 2013. Later, we stopped for breakfast and coffee at Deja Brew Coffee & Bakery in New Oxford, PA, my go-to pitstop on numerous Pennsylvania trips.

We got to the sprawling grounds of Scott & November Nickett's home. We exited the car and made a beeline towards the guests' cars that had come to visit. After lingering around and chatting with the folks we just met, I pointed out where the Nickett collection was, parked over in the back section of the lawn space. The guys were floored. The collection had an assortment of fully restored 1950's and 1960's vehicles. Cadillacs, Dodges, Lincolns, and a few other cars that were not of the era but were dear to Scott due to childhood or young-adult memories were on full display. My phone had died shortly after arriving as it was having charging issues that day (of all days!), so I could only take a few pictures.









It was fun meeting Scott Nickett, his family and his team of restoration professionals. The food for lunch, just like last year, was amazing! Catered lasagna, a meat-lovers version and a vegetarian version (both were delicious with their own distinct taste and flavor), along with sliced bread, salad, desserts and drinks. Later, we had the pleasure of following Scott as he gave us a tour and described his collection to us. He had stories and fun facts for almost every car, including the painstaking detail on replicating the star-glitter carpeting of certain cars by hand (talk about attention to detail!). He also discussed trying to track down hard-to-find parts and having to let go of a fire-damaged 1958 Cadillac Eldorado Brougham to the insurance company (I saw it last year; black with a stainless-steel roof). Then he found another 1958 Brougham, this time in burgundy and even with the original unused and unopened cigarettes and flasks that came with the car when purchased new.

Towards the end, we had a Winner's Choice award where guests chose their top ten favorite cars that were not part of the Nickett collection. My Cadillac placed 9th! We somehow also managed to snag the longest-distance award, as our mileage going up to Pennsylvania was around 240 miles. A silent auction wrapped things up for the day; I got my hands on a complete set of Cadillac hubcaps from the 1970s.

Going home we retraced our steps for the most part, stopping at Chipotle for dinner right before we got to York, PA. Dan, Scott, and I talked about cars and such during our drive, and it was an awesome experience. I aim to go next year, if the Nicketts will have us over again, and I hope to bring more people along. It is an amazing collection, with rare cars from an era that I kind of wish I was born in, a must-see-in-person car show!


