Greetings! Remember last month I listed some issues that the Potomac Region (PR) board is working on? One was the Dealer Show & Automobilia Auction at Sport Cadillac. Although it was really quite successful this year despite setbacks, which volunteers overcame, we want to make the show less adrenalin based going forward. Here is a summary of some main resolutions that came out of a recent officers' meeting.

- Non-members participating in the show: If a non-member comes to a Cadillac show, it's because he/she likes Cadillacs. We want to bring them into the fold. Recruitment to join CLC and PR was hampered this year by lack of contact information to reach out to potential members. We even missed a former NFL player. Future registration forms will show complete information, so the Region's Membership Director and Director will be able to meet and greet every new person on the field and follow up afterward.
- One of the problems seems trivial unless you were the victim, and the solution is paperweights. The registration desk is always under the portico, which acts like a wind tunnel. At this year's windy show a supergust blew away the whole station. People scrambled everywhere to pick up the papers all over the lot. Heavy paperweights and strategic relocation in response to weather conditions will set this straight.
- This year a modified Cadillac and a stretch limo appeared at the show. We had no judging classes for them, so they couldn't really compete. Solution: Re-establish a modified class and a professional car class like the CLC has in order to include everybody.
- Checklists and duty rosters: Checklists will prevent forgetting things we need to have or need to do. Duty rosters will organize volunteers and commit them to staying at their stations for two-hour shifts, not leaving us shorthanded during unscheduled breaks. These tools have worked well for PR at the Washington Auto Show.
- Who's who? Volunteers, especially the parkers, will wear bright vests for easy recognition.



NEW BUSINESS:

• In Maryland, the eligibility criteria for historic vehicle (Class L) license plates has been updated. Vehicles with model years 2000-2005 will no longer qualify for historic tags, effective July 1, 2025. The updated law, passed as part of the Budget and Reconciliation Act (BRFA), restricts historic plates to vehicles with a model year of 1999 or earlier.

Here's a more detailed breakdown:

- > New Rule: Maryland's MVA is enforcing a new rule that limits historic vehicle registration to vehicles with a model year of 1999 or earlier.
- > Previous Rule: Previously, vehicles 20 years old or older qualified for historic tags.
- > Effective Date: This change takes effect for registrations renewed after July 1, 2025.
- Impact: Vehicles with model years 2000-2005 currently registered with historic plates will need to transition to standard registration upon renewal. This means they will be subject to standard registration fees, vehicle inspections, and emissions testing.
- > Grandfathering: There is no provision to grandfather vehicles with existing historic plates, so even those with current historic tags will need to comply with the new rule.
- > Impact on Sales: It's anticipated that this change will lead to a potential influx of 2000-2005 model year vehicles being sold as owners seek to avoid the costs associated with standard registration.
- New Event: Chuck Piel introduced plans for an event called LaSalles & Lattes. More details to follow.



LIBERACE'S ELDORADO BY KUSTORAMA

Most of the restyling featured on Liberace's 1954 Eldorado was found in the piano-keyboard interior upholstery designed by Sam Barris of Barris Kustoms. The interior was assembled by Bob Hauser of Carson Top Shop. The black and white Naugahyde keys were individually sewn as were the initial "L" and Liberace's famous candelabra sewn in the back arm panels. Bottom parts of the front and rear seat were covered with parts of the score from his theme song "I'll be seeing you." Liberace's car won the interior design award from **Motor Trend** magazine in 1954.

The Day Sammy Met Helen:

Destiny On Route 66

T'S A COOL DESERT EVENING ON NOVEMBER 18, 1954, and the day's show is over at the New Frontier Hotel and Casino on the emerging Las Vegas Strip. Still, the show must always go on.



The New Frontier Hotel and Casino, 1954-55

The young entertainer, along with his valet, Charles Head, are getting ready for an all-night drive to Studio City, near Los Angeles. The other members of the Will Mastin Trio approve of the trip and will wait for their youngest member to come back in a few days. The up and coming star of stage, film and television is up to the task. A Vaudeville performer since he was three years old, he is the consummate professional. So when friend and fellow entertainer, Tony Curtis, asks you for a favor, well, you don't say no.

The Will Mastin Trio is the headliner on the new Frontier Casino's stage, with a contract going into 1955, but the show can't go on without the youngest member. So, with due influence by a close friend, the Frontier will have other acts fill in until his return. Show business is like that. A few months earlier, when the young man wanted to stay at the hotel, he was turned away. The New Frontier allowed the trio to play, of course, but they drew the line at having "Negro guests."

Naturally, Las Vegas is all about

money, and when the young man's friend said he wouldn't play the strip anymore, executives listened. When the young man said he wouldn't play if he couldn't stay, the New Frontier took a gamble and opened its doors to all. When Francis Albert, "Frank," Sinatra talks, everybody listens. The gaming commission and the City of Las Vegas quickly followed suit and abolished overt discrimination, due in no small part to the stand made by Sammy Davis Jr. Jim Crow in the desert met its match. By 1960 it was outlawed throughout the land.

The Road to Hollywood

Sammy and Charles Head left the Strip late on the evening on the 18th. With freeways in the vast Mojave Desert still years away, the trip will be more than 290 miles across a landscape of mostly Joshua Trees and sand, the way illuminated by less than half of a full moon. Sammy hasn't had a license for very long, but Charles Head is a good driver, so he will take the monotonous desert driving in Sammy's new 1954 Cadillac El Dorado. It's a fancy car, with all kinds of chrome and bullet-shaped decorations, including a large one in the center of the steering wheel's horn ring.



After driving long hours along the desolate Highway 91, out of Las Vegas, the road merges with Route 66 in Barstow. Sammy rests while his friend and valet motors into the town of Victorville.

We can imagine that the conversation in Victorville went like this: "You look tired, Charlie. I'll drive the rest of the way." With that, Sammy took the wheel of his Caddy, and Charles Head went to sleep in the large back seat.

Nowadays we would say it was a game changer. Sammy Davis Jr. was on his way to an unscheduled meeting with a 72-year-old widow by the name of Helen Boss, in the small San Bernardino community of Verdemont, along the Mother Road. FYI, (unless you already know), before the advent of Interstate-15, to drive Los Angeles, you had to drive east to San Bernardino, go south, then go west again. We know, it almost sounds like the scarecrow's dialogue from the famous, "The Wizard of Oz."

Destiny on Route 66

A few days before Sammy left for Studio City, as Akron, Ohio, started to get into its serious winter mode, Helen Boss prepared

for her yearly trip to the West Coast. Yes, Helen was an early model of a Snowbird. Ever since Helen's husband, a former Akron Chief of Police, died in 1940, she shared her time between Ohio and California, with a few pleasure cruises thrown in for good measure.

Not wanting to make the trip to see her family in Van Nuys, California, on her own, Helen put an ad in the local Akron




newspaper, seeking a companion or two for the trip west. Twenty-two-year-old Thomas McDonald replied. He wanted to get to Edwards Air Force Base to see his brother. Ms. Bessie Roth also wanted to go west. She didn't like the cold. Tom McDonald agreed to drive Helen's car, at least as far as possible. On or about November 18, 1954, Thomas paid for his share of the trip, thanked the ladies, and departed. Headed for the already famous Edwards Air Force Base. Helen and Bessie were on their own.

Helen took over driving, and the two women continued down Route 66, clearing the last of the open desert and the bottom of the Cajon Pass. They passed by Devore Heights, approaching the community of Verdemont, as they headed to San Bernardino and then Van Nuys. It was just before 7:00 a.m. as Helen drove east. The sun, just breaking over the mountains, was in her eyes as she drove. As Helen approached the infamous fork in the road (which is still there, and still confusing drivers), she drove straight onto Kendall Drive past her turn.



1954. The Kendalf-Rite 66 fork was only one lane in each direction, with houses on both sides.

As Helen went onto Kendall Drive, Sammy and Charles weren't too far behind. He was tired, but alert. Like Helen, he had the sun in his eyes as he drove. Realizing her mistake, Helen put her car in reverse, and drove backwards, off Kendall Drive, and onto Route 66. Charles Head was asleep in the back seat of the

Caddy, and Sammy Davis Jr. headed east. Right into the back of Helen's car. The force of the impact pushed Helen's car into a field, and crushed the front of the Cadillac, pushing the big V-8 engine backward towards the dashboard. Sammy Davis Jr. head met the steering wheel with a force violent enough that it fractured his face and dislocated his left eye on that fancy horn. Note: After the accident, Cadillac removed the bullethorn feature from all future models.

Charles Head fared only slightly better, being propelled from

the back seat to the front, where he broke his jaw. Before losing consciousness, Sammy asked about the other car. He was holding his eye in his hand. After being rushed to San Bernardino Community Hospital, Sammy was attended to by Doctor Fredrick Hull, the best eye specialist in town.

Nine days later, Sammy was released from the hospital and, at the urging of Frank Sinatra, recuperated at the singer's Palm Springs home for a few weeks. They were friends till the end, and both were members of the famous "Rat Pack."

Smitten by the Palm Springs desert lifestyle after spending time at Frank's place, and after fortune followed fame, Sammy had a home right in the heart of Palm Springs too (near Jack Benny's house). He was heavily involved in charitable work throughout the area.

Before the year was out, and just weeks after the accident, Sammy Davis Jr. went back to work at the New Frontier, destined for greatness. Before the end of his life, he became a household name throughout the world. He died in 1990. The lights of the Las Vegas Strip were dimmed for 10 minutes in his honor.

So, there you have it. The real facts about the famous accident. Some still believe that Sammy crashed into a train bridge, which

he didn't. His car hit a brick gate entry on Route 66, several hundred feet away, and close to the impact. Dr. Hill continued to practice well into his 80s, and regularly received gifts from the very grateful singer, dancer, Hollywood actor and Las Vegas celebrity. To show his thanks for the attention given at San Bernardino Community Hospital, Sammy Davis Jr. contributed enough money to build a new medical wing, and also put on a free show that included all of the big names of the day.

Bonus Fact

Sammy Davis Jr. was probably most famously known for the popular 1970s children's song, "The Candy Man." He never liked singing it.

I think all of us got into the antique car hobby for similar reasons: the comradery with other owners and the satisfaction of either restoring a vehicle to its best condition or just keeping something dripping with patina and 10-30w oil on the road.

I'm still in the house my wife and I bought in January 1984 in Silver Spring, MD. One town over is the quirky and lovely city of Takoma Park. It was incorporated in 1888 and still has many of the beautiful Victorian bungalows 137 years later residing on its hilly, tree-lined streets. There is a small downtown area with numerous restaurants, small businesses and a Red Line Metro stop. They also have a 4th of July parade that is 136 years old and a Washington-area tradition.



All cars are welcomed at the parade that lasts about 20 minutes from start to finish. Without any marching bands, Boy Scouts, bagpipers, politicians running for office, etc., the cars crawl along at a glacial pace. That's good because the parade route is lined with some very nice folks with their kids, grandkids, dogs, neighbors, all of whom mesh together for a very nice community feeling. Drivers, dignitaries and spectators all wave to each other. Occasionally I hear, "Nice Car!" We all have a good time.





While driving, I am constantly glancing over to the engine temperature gauge. Overheating on a hot summer day is a real concern. With that said, there is one rule of thumb for parade cars: have a great radiator and cap. Recently flushed with new fluid and the installation of a new thermostat, hoses and clamps, my 1992 Eldorado was ready to go, but there is still the possibility of flirting with 220+ degrees, higher than the normal 185-degree comfort zone. Keeping the A/C off and the windows down helps, but I always keep a small cooler bag of water bottles in the back seat, just in case.

Almost every person I've driven has been appreciative of the effort it takes to decorate the car for the parade and accommodate the guest. However, there was one local politician who was running for re-election that was disappointed to see my car was NOT a convertible. The elected official did not hide their disappointment with the vehicle they were going to be riding in that day. Hey, if a beautiful, decorated red Cadillac isn't good enough, the politician can always participate in a parade walking with Boy Scouts and bagpipers.

In August 2024, CLC Potomac Region member Steve Plunkett of Ontario, Canada (pictured above left) was interviewed by Lou Costabile for a 17-minute <u>My Car Story</u> video. The featured car was Steve's 1941 Cadillac custom limousine known as **The Duchess**.

The video begins with Steve telling Lou he has owned the car for about eight years. The previous owner was in the US and spent \$400,000 restoring the Cadillac, but he never showed it. Steve describes his enjoyment is showing / debuting cars at certain events and this video does a great job of doing that.

The Duchess is a custom-built one-off car designed by Harley Earl and Bill Mitchell. It shares no body panel with any other Cadillac of that year. The long diagonal body line was "stolen" by Buick the following year, remaining a styling queue with their models for years.



The background on this car is very interesting. King Edward VIIII of the United Kingdom abdicated his throne in 1936 to marry the twice-divorced American Wallis Simpson. Although they were ostracized at home, they were treated like celebrities outside the UK. They had a residence at the Waldorf Astoria in New York for years and commissioned the build of this car by General Motors for their personal use. The car's build, overseen by Alfred Sloan, GM CEO, cost \$14,000. Crowds of people would gather to get a glimpse of the couple wherever they went (pictured left). 
